

Which European countries get the most time off over Christmas? Armenia among leaders

Europe is a varied continent with plenty of different Christmas traditions. However, one thing that everyone gets is holiday. Every single country in Europe has at least one statutory day off in the period between 15 December and 15 January, The Guardian reports.

Who gets the most though?

The majority of countries in Europe are Christian, whether that is Catholic, Protestant or Orthodox and bearing that in mind there are four key dates to look for:

25 December – Catholic/Protestant Christmas Day, which is the purported anniversary of the birth of Christ

New Year's Day – in terms of the Gregorian calendar, which every single country gets as a holiday

6 January – Epiphany, when Jesus was supposed to



have appeared to the Magi (or three wise men)
7 January – Russian Orthodox Christmas
Dav.

Around that there are several eves and saints' days but those four are the bedrock of the holiday season. There are secular days too, usually related to revolutions or new declarations of statehood that happened to fall in this time of year.

Russia, the home of the Eastern Orthodox

Church, has the most days off over the Christmas period of any European country. Every day between New Year and the day after Russian Orthodox Christmas is a holiday, giving them eight off in total.

Closely following the Russians with seven are Armenia and Liechtenstein. The latter country gets Christmas Eve through to Boxing Day off as well as the two days either side of the New Year.

President Sargsyan attends CSTO meeting in Moscow

Armenian President Serzh Sargsyan participated at 23 December the session of the Collective Security Council of the Collective Security Treaty Organization (CSTO) in Moscow.

Speaking at the session, President Sargsyan briefed his counterparts on the situation in the South Caucasus, particularly the incidents at the Armenian-Azerbaijani border and the line of contact and underlined that Armenia deeps the escalation of tension around the Karabakh conflict and the militarization of the region unacceptable

"The documents we adopted today are targeted at fighting the existing and emerging challenges with joint effort. I'm confident they will contribute to the development of the CSTO and the wellbeing of our countries and peoples," President Sargsyan said.

"The adoption of decisions on the fur-



ther reinforcement of mechanisms of coordinating the foreign policy will be conducive to the raise of the organization's rating," the President said.

Serzh Sargsyan said the creation of the CSTO joint air force would be a proper step for the development of military cooperation between the CSTO member states.

He voiced confidence that the information security package would also serve for the intensification of cooperation between the corresponding structures of the member states.

Nagorno-Karabakh will not enter EEU: Belarus Deputy FM

Nagorno-Karabakh will not become part of the Eurasian Economic Union (EEU) after Armenia's accession, Belarusian First Deputy Foreign Minister Alexander Mikhnevich said while presenting the draft law on the ratification of the treaty on Armenia's accession to the EEU, BelTA reports.

"We were concerned about the fact that

the territories that do not form part of Armenia could join the Customs Union. The Armenian side appeared to be understanding of this requirement, of our request. A memorandum stating that Nagorno-Karabakh is not part of Armenia was attached to the agreement. The Armenian side made an official verbal statement," Alexander Mikhnevich noted.

He also emphasized that there are no obstacles for Armenia to become de facto member of the Customs Union and the EEU.

Besides, Alexander Mikhnevich pointed out that before the agreement on Armenia's accession to the EEU was signed, the country had done a lot of work to bring its regulations in line with the ones already adopted by Belarus, Russia, and Kazakhstan.

Yerevan 'still committed' to closer ties with West

Armenia's leadership has assured Western powers that it will continue deepening relations with them even after joining the Eurasian Economic Union (EEU), the outgoing U.S. ambassador in Yerevan, John Heffern, said on December 19.

John Heffern said that the United States trusts in these assurances because it believes that closer ties with the West are "not incompatible" with Yerevan's membership in the Russian-led alliance of ex-Soviet states. The U.S. and the European Union are therefore trying to help Armenia develop a "strategic" capacity to closely cooperate with both the West and Russia, he said.

"We think that Armenia can benefit from both," Heffern told a farewell news conference in the U.S. Embassy in Yerevan. Heffern's incoming successor, Richard Mills, made similar statements during U.S. congressional hearings on his candidacy held in September. "We have stressed since Armenia's decision [to join the EEU] that strengthened economic collaboration with the United States and Europe can complement Armenia's future membership in the Eurasian Economic Union," he said.

"We want to do that in every sector. Economic sector, diplomatic, political and even security," stressed Heffern. He argued that membership in the Russian-led Collective Security Treaty Organization has not kept Armenia from increasingly cooperating with NATO. "Both organizations benefit from Armenia's participation," he said.

U.S. President Barack Obama described U.S.-Armenian relations as

"strong" and pledged to strengthen them when he congratulated President Serzh Sargsyan on Armenia's Independence Day in September. "The deep bonds between the United States and Armenia are strong," Secretary of State John Kerry said in a separate statement.



Ukrainian investors buy into Armenian Airline



A Ukrainian investment fund announced the purchase of a 49 percent stake in Armenia's leading airline on December 19, pledging to help restart soon its commercial flights that were suspended two months ago.

Vladimir Bobylev, the chief executive of the East Prospect Fund, pledged to invest at least \$30 million in the troubled Air Armenia carrier. Armenian news agencies quoted him as saying that it plans to replace and expand the company's small fleet of aircraft in the coming months.

It was not clear how much the fund, registered in the British Virgin Islands but headquartered in Kiev, paid for the minority share. It valued Air Armenia at \$50 million on its website.

Air Armenia specialized in cargo shipments by air until Armenia's flagship airline, Armavia, went bankrupt in April 2013, leading to the full liberalization of the Armenian civil aviation sector. The small carrier took over some of Armavia's flights later in 2013.

Air Armenia halted the flights to a dozen destinations in Russia and Europe in late October as a result of a financial dispute with Russia's national air navigation service. It accused the Rosaeronavigatsia agency of scaring away its customers with false statements about its outstanding

debts. Aviation experts believe that the company also struggled to compete with much larger Russian airlines.

According to Bobylev, Air Armenia is currently undergoing restructuring and should able to resume flights in March. "I would like our fund to be presented not so much as a new Air Armenia shareholder but as an investor," the Arka news agency quoted him as telling a joint news conference with Arsen Avetisyan, Air Armenia's director and main official shareholder.

"We have understandings on \$30 million [in investments] for the first phase of operations but won't confine ourselves to that figure," he said.

On its website East Prospect presents itself as a fund manager specializing in "problematic assets." Its investment portfolio, estimated at \$2.5 billion, mainly consists of mining operations in Ukraine.

Armenia, Turkmenistan mull the launching of direct flights



Political consultations between the Foreign Ministries of Armenia and Turkmenistan were held in Yerevan.

From the Armenian side the consultations were chaired by Deputy Foreign Minister Shavarsh Kocharyan. The Turkmen Co-Chair was First Deputy Minister Vepa Khajiyev.

The parties hailed the current level of bilateral relations. They attached importance to the implementation of the agreements reached at the 6th sitting of the Armenian-Turkmen Intergovernmental Commission on Economic Cooperation held in Yerevan on December 23, and stressed the need to deepen and develop the cooperation in the fields of culture, sports, education and science, agriculture, health-care, tourism and others.

Reference was made to the perspectives of expansion of the legal framework

between the two countries, the opportunities of launching direct flights, as well as cooperation within the framework of international organizations.

Issues on international and regional agenda were also discussed.

Armenian Security Chief Warns Opposition

The head of Armenia's most powerful security agency has warned opposition groups against trying to forcibly topple the government, saying that such attempts would meet with a "resolute" response.

Gorik Hakobyan, the director of the National Security Service (NSS), blasted unnamed opposition politicians "making irresponsible calls for uprisings and a violent overthrow of the authorities" as he marked a professional holiday of the former Armenian branch of the Soviet KGB on Saturday.

"We will take all necessary measures to resolutely thwart any illegal action aimed at disrupting the country's constitutional order. This is not a threat. We just see a need to warn," Hakobyan told hundreds of NSS officers at a special meeting that was also attended by Prime Minister Hovik Abrahamyan and the heads of other law-enforcement bodies.

In his speech cited by the Armenpress news agency, Hakobyan stressed that the NSS has no intention to crack down on dissent or limit citizens' freedom of assembly. He said it would only act strongly against attempts to "provoke mass disturbances and clashes."

The warning appeared to be addressed to Armenia's three leading opposition parties that held in September and October a series

of nationwide protests purportedly aimed at achieving "regime change" in the country. One of their leaders has described their campaign as a "velvet revolution."

Contrary to some expectations, those rallies did not develop into non-stop anti-government protests apparently because of a cautious stance taken by Prosperous Armenia (BHK), the largest of the parties challenging President Serzh Sargsyan. Still, the opposition trio has pledged to continue its campaign in the coming months.

"I don't have the competence or desire to comment on the statements made by the NSS chief," BHK spokesman Tigran Urikhanyan said on December 22. "I see nothing in his statements which is directed at the BHK."

But Armen Martirosyan, a leader of the opposition Zharangutyun (Heritage), described Hakobyan's statement as a sign of mounting government fears. "The authorities are worried not just about activities of opposition forces," he told RFE/RL's Armenian service."They know very well what policies they have implemented and the resulting socioeconomic situation."

Martirosyan made clear that the Armenian opposition could take "large-scale actions" next spring. "There is no going back," he said.

Heritage Party likely to participate in next month's conference called by PAP leader

Deputy chairman of the opposition Heritage party Armen Martirosyan thinks that next month the party will participate in the conference called by the Prosperous Armenia Party (PAP) leader.

On Wednesday leader of the PAP Gagik Tsarukyan disseminated a statement where he said that on January 20 he invited political forces, public organizations, civil initiatives and movements to the event.

Earlier this week Tsarukyan's spokesperson said that the PAP leader wants to hear opinions of different political forces and jointly determine further steps "because vitally important issues will have to be tackled".

On October 10 and 24 the PAP, the Armenian National Congress and Heritage parties held rallies in Yerevan as part of what they described as a popular movement. During those rallies calls for a change of government were made. On December 10, International Human Rights Day, the three parties also held a joint rally and a march.

Many think, however, the 'hot autumn' promised by the opposition thus ended.

Addressing this issue on Thursday



Armen Martirosyan told reporters: "The perceptions of the hot autumn that existed did not come true, because my expectation was a complete change of government, but if we look at the political processes, it was indeed 'hot'. We had two perfect rallies; we had the government's retreat and readiness to discuss the 12 points."

Upon ArmeniaNow's request, the Heritage representative addressed expectations from 2015 and predicted a difficult year for Armenia.

"Depending on the behavior of Russia, it will become clear whether sanctions will go deeper or not, whether the oil price will go up or down, whether the ruble exchange rate will rise or fall," Martirosyan said, meaning Western sanctions imposed on Russia related over the crisis in Ukraine.

"If Russia's social-economic state improves, it will positively impact Armenia, if not – naturally it will have an adverse effect on Armenia," he concluded.

Former police intel officer gives testimony in Hrant Dink case



Former Trabzon police intelligence branch chief Faruk Sari gave his testimony to Istanbul's prosecutor as a suspect in the murder case of Armenian-Turkish journalist Hrant Dink in 2007, the Hurriyet Daily News reports.

The prosecutor had demanded the arrest of Sari for his role in the "intended murder that took place due to negligence." However, an Istanbul court decided that Sari would be tried without arrest on probation on Dec. 24.

Prosecutor Gökalp Kökçü interrogated Sari on Dec. 24 as part

of the ongoing trial. The Dink murder case is being retried after the Interior Ministry allowed the prosecution of several public officials who were accused of negligence in the course of events which ended in the murder.

Dink was assassinated by Ogün Samast, who is serving 22 years and 10 months in a high-security F-type prison, in broad daylight on a busy street outside the office of the bilingual Turkish-Armenian weekly Agos in Istanbul's Sisli district on Jan. 19, 2007. The assassination caused outrage across the country, sending hundreds of thousands to the streets in mass rallies.

When the prosecutor asked why he did not took any measures to prevent the murder, Sari responded that he had no information about the murder attempt. The prosecutor sent him to the court, demanding his arrest. The court released Sari on probation. The investigation into Dink's murder took a different path after the government launched a fight against the so-called "parallel structure," which the government uses to refer to the movement of U.S.-based Islamic scholar Fethullah Gülen. The Justice Ministry has cleared the way for investigations into nine civil servants accused of negligence in Dink's murder.

Clooney wife to represent Armenia at ECHR



Amal Ramzi Alamuddin, the wife of prominent Hollywood actor and human rights activist George Clooney, will be one of the attorneys representing Armenia next month at the European Court of Human Rights (ECHR), according to Harut Sassounian, the publisher of The California Courier newspaper.

Sassounian describes Mrs. Clooney as "a highly regarded attorney specializing in international law, criminal law, human rights, and extradition" who has been involved in several major lawsuits, including the defense of Julian Assange of WikiLeaks and former Ukrainian Prime Minister Yulia Tymoshenko.

"With such impeccable credentials, Mrs. Clooney will be a great asset to Armenia's legal team in Strasbourg, in the appeal of Perincek vs. Switzerland before the Grand Chamber of the European Court of Human Rights on January 28," Sassounian writes in a column,

according to Asbarez.com.

Under the provisions of the Swiss law, in 2007, Turkish nationalist Dogu Perincek was convicted for denying the Armenian Genocide. Failing to win two appeals against the judgment, Perincek appealed the Swiss ruling to the ECHR, which on December 17 ruled that the Swiss courts' rulings violated the appellant's right to freedom of expression. Switzerland later appealed the ECHR ruling and Armenia will be engaged as a third party in the appeal hearing.

Last year, when ECHR's lower court was considering Perincek's case, Armenia did not participate. Turkey, however, intervened by submitting extensive documentation questioning the veracity of the Armenian Genocide. This time around Armenia will take part with a strong legal team," writes Sassounian.

"It is imperative that on the eve of the Armenian Genocide's Centennial in 2015, ECHR's Grand Chamber reverse the lower court's flawed ruling, restoring the integrity of Swiss laws and preventing Turkey and Perincek from exporting their genocide denialism to Europe and beyond!"

Symposium on the Armenian vity of Ani to be held at Columbia University

Symposium on "Monuments and Memory: Material Culture and the Aftermaths of Histories of Mass Violence," with a Focus on the Ruins of the Armenian City of Ani, to be Held at Columbia University, February 20, 2015, Massis Post reports.

In commemoration of the 100th anniversary of the Armenian Genocide, a groundbreaking symposium will be held at Columbia and sponsored by the Armenian Center of Columbia University, Columbia's Institute for the Study of Human Rights and the Institute for Comparative Literature and Society. Peter Balakian, Donald M. Constance H. Rebar Professor of the Humanities at Colgate University, and Rachel Goshgarian, Assistant Professor of History at Lafayette College, are organizers and hosts of the event.

The symposium will be groundbreaking in its comparative analysis of Jewish monuments in eastern Europe, Muslim monuments in the Balkans, and Armenian Christian monuments in Turkey. Issues of preservation, social justice, and restitution will be discussed.

"The goal of this conference is to place the lamentable situation of Armenian monuments in Turkey into larger contexts," said Dr. Rachel



Goshgarian, Assistant Professor of History at Lafayette College. "After visiting so many Armenian constructions in Turkey — in various states of repair or disrepair — over the course of the past ten years, one question consistently came to my mind: what happens to monuments when they kind of lose their monumentality? This question is worthwhile in many contexts, but in the framework of modern Turkey, offers us the opportunity to consider the differences between the ways in which people living with Armenian mon-

uments might differ from overarching governmental actions or concerns."

"The aftermath of human rights violence is always long and complex and the fate of material culture and especially major and sacred monuments such as churches, synagogues and mosques raise complex issues about restitution, identity, and social justice," said Balakian. "Our symposium will bring together some major scholars from around the world to discuss these issues and others."

Turkey's provocations will continue into 2015: Hayk Demoyan

Turkey will keep on with its provocative actions, especially ahead of the 100th anniversary of the Armenian Genocide, Director of the Armenian Genocide Museum Institute (AGMI) Hayk Demoyan told reporters today. According to him, the processes aimed at frustrating the events prepared by the Armenian side for 2015 are already apparent.

"There are attempts to neutralize the influence of events organized by the Armenian agencies or the Diaspora. The second policy, which we conditionally call 'penetration attempt,' is the organization of parallel events in Armenia and Diaspora by Turkish historians and people under Turkish influence," Demoyan said. Among the examples he noted the



presentation of Hasan Cemal's book in Yerevan and Paris.

He said the provocations will continue into 2015, and added that our compa-

triots in the Diaspora have a serious work to do in this regard. He urged to be cautious of Turkish traps ahead of the Genocide centennial.

Economist: Inflation in Armenia inconsistent with currency depreciation

The Armenian government's claims that the December inflation was conditioned by the dram's devaluation and is within the projected limits cannot be true, economist Bagrat Asatryan said on Thursday.

The former Central Bank governor believes there is no direct correlation between the devaluation of the national currency and inflation, although Armenia is mostly an importing country and naturally it is not possible to avoid inflation.

"There is dependency, but it is nothing, if we count based on current developments, then inflation must have been only 0.3-0.5 percent. There is no direct correlation; simply in Armenia the pricing policy is not efficient. The gas price has not increased yet, and it is what affects price formation most," Asatryan told reporters today.

Emphasizing that mistrust toward the government is the main cause of the dram's drastic devaluation and the panic and the main cause for the economic situation that followed, the economist said that it was possible to prevent the situation if the government implemented a correct policy.

"They say that exchange offices did speculations, but they are made exactly for that. They must get out of such a level of debate and work ethic and make decisions regarding the financial system, they must make problems public and think about their solutions," Asatryan said.

The dram depreciated drastically on December 17, which many observers evaluated as "a day of panic currency buying", when the dram exchange rate hit its historic lows at above 600 AMD, after which it quickly rebounded settling at 455-465 AMD per dollar.

"Approaches and decisions toward stabilization of the financial system are important, and the Central Bank has that potential," Asatryan said. "The policy implemented during the dram devaluation was a result of political pressure."

"For 20 years we've been spending money to have an independent Central Bank. But what do we have now?" he said, adding that risks for the banking system have increased today.

Armenian Central Bank raises refinancing rate after currency fall

Armenia's Central Bank has raised its key refinancing rate from 6.75 percent to 8.5 percent, citing the need to curb inflation after the national currency, the dram, registered a fall by more than 10 percent.

The Central Bank kept its refinancing rate unchanged at 6.75 percent in September and November after cutting it from 7.00 percent in August.

It said the monthly inflation in November stood at 1.3 percent, compared to the inflation of 1.0 percent in October.

Prices for some basic foodstuffs and other essentials shot up in Armenia earlier this month amid a dramatic depreciation of the national currency, the dram. Amid what many observers described as "panic currency buying" by December 17 the dram hit its historic lows at over 600, before rebounding quickly to its current levels of 450-460 per US dollar. The prices for most goods that were raised by retailers also decreased, but some of them still remain higher than the "pre-crisis" level.

Weaker dream not immediately triggers increase in exports, says association head

Armenian exports are falling, says Raffi Mkhchyan, the head of Armenia's Exporters Union, citing statistics showing that in November, compared to the same period of 2013, the fall made 18 percent.

"The most important and tangible question is that people have a false opinion that when the dram depreciates large-scale exports will start, it is not exactly so and has never been, time and other factors are necessary for that," Mkhchyan told reporters on Tuesday, addressing the situation when the national currency is getting weaker against the dollar, which according to economic theories should be auspicious for exporting businesses.

According to Mkhchyan, Armenia is not famous for large scales of export. "Nor can we say that Armenia can surprise the world with its volumes of production," he added.

"The situation of the last 10 days were a considerable damage to the economy, we lost many agreements, mostly with Russia.

The main reason was the instability of the ruble, which devaluated by 50-60 percent, nevertheless, we can review and change agreements quickly, and we can work with Russia with dollars," he said. (While the Armenian dram was falling, the Russian ruble was falling to a greater extent last week, making it even less profitable for Armenian exporters to supply goods to Russia).

According to Mkhchyan, after



Armenia becomes a member of the Eurasian Economic Union (EEU) from January 1, Russia will not create favorable financial conditions for Armenia.

"We will not immediately feel the consequences of what happened in Armenia recently, that will come in 2015," he said.

On December 17 the Armenian dram fell to as low as 600 AMD/1US\$ for a while before rebounding and prices for some goods were raised by up to 30 percent. Today at most currency exchange offices one dollar can be bought for 455-460 AMD.

On Monday, during a reception for the business community, Armenian President Serzh Sargsyan said that some of the current year's difficulties and uncertainties that have objective reasons are likely to continue in Armenia in 2015. H also spoke about challenges and opportunities of Eurasian integration.

"I have no doubts that our entrepreneurs are competitive and have what to say and will have their role in the new economic union as well," Sargsyan said.

"Ars Lunga" Duo and the jubilees of the year

The idea of creating and implementing the "Anthology of Armenian Chamber Music" project belongs to "Ars Lunga" duo, namely to cellist **Aram Tatalyan** and pianist **Julietta Vardanyan**. The program encompasses a wide range of traditions of Armenian academic music from the beginning of the 20th century till now. Works of young Armenian musicians have also been included in the project; some of them presented a number of their works to "Ars Lunga" duo. The General Partner of the "Anthology of Armenian Chamber Music" project is VivaCell-MTS.

"In the world of art this year is significant because it marks the anniversaries of a number of prominent figures in Armenian classical music. This is a great opportunity to once again remember and honor our classics, but it is also important to assess and support the contemporary composers of classical music who say a new word in art. Today's concert has combined these two ideas and certifies that our creative mind is alive and is not limited to past achievements, " mentioned VivaCell-MTS General Manager Ralph

Yirikian.

The "Anthology of Armenian Chamber Music" project has several parts.

In the first part of the "Anthology of Armenian Chamber Music" project the "Ars Lunga" duo has compiled works of 60 Armenian composers of the 20th -21st centuries, written for cello and piano, has performed them and recorded them in compliance with modern requirements of technology. The result of the project was the release of collections which make sets of 12 CDs and are completed with brochures presenting the biographies of the composers.

At present the "Ars Lunga" duo is working on the second part of the "Anthology of Armenian Chamber Music" project which will present complete works for piano trio (piano, violin, cello) by Armenian composers.

Innovative and Creative Learning Centers provided to Lori children

Creativity Lab opened in the Village of Tumanyan as a result of VivaCell-MTS and COAF Collaboration

VivaCell-MTS and the Children of Armenia Fund (COAF) helped realize a long-expected dream of the children from Tumanyan community of Lori Marz: a technology classroom, Creativity Lab, was established in the local school, to be used by all the schoolchildren and teachers of Tumanyan community, as well as youth from the neighboring villages.

A Creativity Lab is a learning center corresponding to the requirements of contemporary education, equipped with a smart board, modern computers, as well as special mobile furniture. The latter is adaptable for working individually, in pairs and in groups.

The creative environment existing in such educational facilities as creativity labs allows for implementation of multifunctional activities and correlation of various tasks, including classes with the application of computers and technologies, training sessions, discussions, readings, games and intellectual activity. The projects initiated and implemented jointly by COAF and VivaCell-MTS aim at ensuring the equal development of rural communities and supplement the village schools with informational and communication technologies.

By improving facilities, transfer of some babies can be avoided.

The project with VivaCell-MTS concentrates on the first day of life to ensure each maternity facility has doctors and nurses with the right knowledge and equipment to improve survival of the vulnerable newborn babies. In addition to the equipment being provided, education, training and support for the medical staff continues.

Azeri-Israeli Propagandist Throws Stones at Armenia from Glass House

The JNS.org website (Jewish and Israel news) posted a venomous, anti-Armenian article by Arye Gut with a bombastic headline: "Anti-Semitism in Armenia: A Clear and Present Danger."

JNS.org identifies the author as "an Azerbaijani Israeli" who is "a board member of the Israeli-Azerbaijani International Organization, official coordinator of the 'Justice for Khojaly!' international campaign in Israel, and an expert in international relations."

Dozens of Azeri and Turkic media outlets rushed to reprint this Armenophobic propaganda, stressing that it originated from a 'popular' Jewish news source. The article may have been written in Baku, planted in Israeli and Jewish publications, and then reprinted in Azerbaijan to lead readers into thinking that it comes from an objective third party source.

Gut claims that Armenia's Jewish minority "shrunk dramatically" after the end of "a more tolerant" Soviet rule! He admits, as an afterthought, that "Armenia's ongoing economic collapse" is equally responsible for the dwindling number of Jews "from more than 5,000 to just a few hundred." Gut fails to mention, however, that during the same period over one million Armenians also left their homeland due to abysmal economic conditions.

The Azeri-Israeli author further accuses Armenians of "cultural violence," referring to the existence of anti-Semitic books and TV programs. Yet he grudgingly acknowledges that "such unfortunate incidents" occur "in many countries." If that is the case, why is he singling out Armenia? Could it be that he has ulterior motives? As "official coordinator of the 'Justice for Khojaly!' international campaign in Israel," is Gut a paid agent or doing all this hard work - writing pro-Azerbaijan/anti-Armenia articles - out of the goodness of his heart?

Gut goes on to defame Armenians, claiming that "around 1.3 million out of 2.2 million adults in Armenia expressed anti-

Semitic attitudes." He misleads readers into thinking that he has personally interviewed 1.3 million Armenians all of whom supposedly made anti-Jewish statements! What Gut is referring to is Anti-Defamation League's (ADL) flawed global survey which reported that 58% of a random sample of 500 Armenians, interviewed mostly by telephone, expressed anti-Semitic views. As Gut's figure of 1.3 million Armenians comes from ADL's survey, he should have also mentioned the results of the same survev for his beloved Azerbaijan - one of the worst violators of human rights in the world - which shows that 2.4 million Azeris harbored anti-Semitic sentiments, almost double the number of Armenians!

Since Gut is concealing Azerbaijan's figures, let's expose them to see how they compare with those of Armenia, based on the results of ADL's 11-question survey:

- 1. 3.2 million Azeris and 1.5 million Armenians replied "probably true": "Jews are more loyal to Israel than to the country they live in."
- 2. 3.4 million Azeris and 1.6 million Armenians replied "probably true": "Jews have too much power in the business world."
- 3. 3.2 million Azeris and 1.5 million Armenians replied "probably true": "Jews have too much power in international financial markets."
- 4. 2 million Azeris and 1 million Armenians replied "probably true": "Jews still talk too much about what happened to them in the Holocaust."
- 5. 3.4 million Azeris and 1.3 million Armenians replied "probably true": "Jews don't care what happens to anyone but their

own kind "

- 6. 2.5 million Azeris and 1.1 million Armenians replied "probably true": "Jews have too much control over global affairs."
- 7. 2.5 million Azeris and 1.1 million Armenians replied "probably true": "Jews have too much control over the United States government."
- 8. 2.4 million Azeris and 1.2 million Armenians replied "probably true": "Jews think they are better than other people."
- 9. 2.3 million Azeris and 0.9 million Armenians replied "probably true": "Jews have too much control over the global media."
- 10. 2 million Azeris and 0.8 million Armenians replied "probably true": "Jews are responsible for most of the world's wars."
- 11. 2.4 million Azeris and 1.4 million Armenians replied "probably true": "People hate Jews because of the way Jews behave."

ADL's Global Survey results are even more devastating for Turkey - 34 million Turks out of an adult population of 49 million are found to be anti-Semitic.

Gut concludes his anti-Armenian diatribe by depicting the so-called "Khojaly massacre" as "one of the worst tragedies of the 20th century," thereby raising the alleged killing of "613 people" in Khojaly during the Karabagh war to the level of 6 million victims of the Jewish Holocaust and 1.5 million victims of the Armenian Genocide!

Armenian and Kurdish village names restored in Van

The Van Metropolitan Municipal Council restored the old names of 704 neighborhoods, the Armenian Weekly reports quoting Turkish newspapers.

The municipality has said that it will use these old names in its official documents. In each local municipality research was conducted to identify the old names of the neighborhoods.

In Baskale 81 villages and neighborhoods received their old names back; in Çaldiran 86; in Çatak 34; in Edremit 18; in Ercis 105; in Gevas 37; in Gürpinar 174; in Ipekyolu 50; in Muradiye 41; in Özalp 53; and inside the city proper 25.

The decision was approved by members of the council who were from the pro-Kurdish party as well as the ruling party. Reportedly, village signs will also be changed and include the Kurdish and



Armenian names.

Before the Genocide, there were around 90,000 Armenians living in 350 villages in what is today the province of Van, according to Les Arméniens dans

l'Empire Ottoman à la veille du génocide by historians Raymond Kevorkian and Paul Paboudjian. There were 382 churches and 65 monasteries in the area.

The 6 most ancient countries of the world: Armenia among them

The first states emerged about 6,000 years ago, but not all of them have survived. Some disappeared forever, others have only their name left. A Russian website presents the six modern countries that have maintained links with the Ancient World. These include Armenia, Iran, China, Greece, Egypt and Japan.

"The history of Armenians statehood counts 2,500 years, but its roots should be looked for even deeper, in the Kingdom of Arme-Shupria (12th century BC), which, according to historian Boris Piatrovsky, grew into a Scythian-Armenian union in the 7-6th centuries BC," the russian7.ru website reminds.

According to the report, Ancient Armenia was a conglomerate of kingdoms and states, which existed simultaneously or successes each other. The website notes that the term "Armenia" was first mentioned in the Behistun inscription (521 BC) of the King of Persia, Darius I, who used the name to describe the Persian satrapy on the territory of the disappeared




Kingdom of Urartu.

Al-Monitor: Planned Armenian genocide memorial ruffles Ankara

A proposed art project commemorating the 1915 mass slaughter by the Ottoman Turks of the empire's Armenian subjects has sparked a tug-of-war between the Turkish government and Switzerland's ethnic Armenian community, sharpening decades of mutual suspicion and resentment and pitting the federal government in Bern against the local government in Geneva, where the monument is to be placed, Al-Monitor writes.

With only months to go before the April 24 centenary of the genocide, the stakes are higher than ever — and so far, Turkey is prevailing. In early December, the Swiss Foreign Ministry declared that it opposes erecting the Armenian monument in the canton of Geneva because "it is important for federal authorities to preserve the absolute impartiality of Geneva," where the United Nations and various other international organizations are headquartered, Turkey's semi-official Anadolu news agency crowed.

More likely, the Swiss are responding to Turkish bullying, Armenian activists and diplomatic observers say. The UN has reportedly also sided with Turkey. A UN spokeswoman in Geneva declined to comment.

"It is an international scandal that Swiss diplomacy surrendered so voluntarily to Turkish pressure," complained Vicken Cheterian, a

Geneva-based ethnic Armenian academic in an interview with Al-Monitor. "A beautiful artwork is now in exile in search of a safe haven where it can rest, to reflect the memory of a people sacrificed and humanity in denial."

The project, called "Reverberes de la Memoire," or "Streetlights of Memory," consists of eight lampposts placed in an arc in parkland lying between the International Red Cross building and the Palais des Nations,

where the United Nations' precursor, the League of Nations, once stood. The lamp posts will soar to nine meters (29.5 ft.) and sprout elongated chrome tear drops in which pedestrians can view their own reflections. The pillars will be inscribed with texts about exile and dispossession by acclaimed French Armenian psychoanalyst Janine Altounian, whose parents survived the genocide.

A Turkish Foreign Ministry spokesman did not return calls for comment. But Turkish officials speaking on condition of strict anonymity privately acknowledged to Al-Monitor that the Swiss government had been "encouraged" to scupper the bronze memorial, which was conceived in 2008 by the French Armenian artist Melik Ohanian. In keeping with Switzerland's federal laws, the final say rests with the cantonal government in Geneva, expected to deliver its verdict in mid-January. Stefan Kristensen, a Swiss Armenian activist, says should the local administration follow the Foreign Ministry's advice, the project organizers will pursue the matter in court. "There is no legal basis for caving to pressure from Bern and Ankara," Kristensen told Al-Monitor.

Sympathy for the Armenians among the Swiss people is nothing new. In the late 19th century, when the ruling Ottoman Sultan Abdul Hamid II ordered pogroms against the Armenians, more than 400,000 Swiss citizens (13.7% of the population) signed a petition demanding that their federal government intervene with the Sublime Porte to end its brutality.

Swiss pharmacist Jacob Kunzler and his wife, Elizabeth, figure prominently in the Armenian pantheon of heroes. Between 1899 and 1922, the couple saved thousands of Armenian orphans in Turkey and Lebanon.

Moreover, Switzerland has laws that criminalize denying or justifying genocide. In 2007, a federal court found Turkish writer and leftwing politician Dogu Perincek guilty of racial discrimination for calling the

genocide "an international lie" on Swiss soil. The case wound up in the European Court of Human Rights (ECHR) in 2013. The Strasbourg-based court concluded that Switzerland had violated Perincek's right to free speech. In March, Switzerland appealed to the ECHR's 17-judge Grand Chamber to overturn the ruling. Armenia waded in on Switzerland's side with its own team of lawyers. The latter is said to include Amal Alamuddin, the much-respected Lebanese-born international human rights lawyer married to actor George Clooney. In a further twist, Alamuddin's great uncle, Najib, is said to have been married to Kunzler's daughter, Ida.

Perincek was merely parroting Turkey's official line. Turkey denies that the 1915 tragedy constitutes genocide. Imposing its own version of events — that most of the Armenians died of exposure, starvation and disease during forced deportations to the Syrian desert — has long been a cornerstone of Turkish foreign policy. Sabotaging planned genocide memorials is an integral part of this. Thus, when the ethnic Armenian residents of the California town of Montebello decided to build a monument to honor the victims of 1915 in the mid-1960s, Myron Goldsmith, a retired army major who doubled as Turkey's honorary consul general, lobbied the city council to prevent its construction.

The episode was colorfully depicted in journalist Michael Bobelian's 2009 book "Children of Armenia: A Forgotten Genocide and the Century-Long Struggle for Justice." We learn, for instance, that Goldman accused the Armenians of "concocting a Communist plot" and that the State Department "contacted Montebello's city council to pressure it to shut down the project." In the end, the council voted in favor of the monument but "bowed to the State Department's wishes,"


spurning Armenian demands for the genocide to be mentioned in its dedicatory plaque. A former Turkish intelligence officer who requested anonymity claimed in remarks to Al-Monitor that the Turkish government had "wasted hundreds of thousands of dollars" in covert operations to deface Armenian genocide memorials. California is home to the largest Armenian diaspora community in the United States, and three Turkish diplomats were murdered there in revenge killings carried out by ethnic Armenians between 1973 and 1982.

In 2011, the battle against monuments shifted to Kars, a city close to Turkey's sealed border with Armenia, where a former mayor commissioned a sculpture that was meant to symbolize reconciliation. Turkey's President (then Prime Minister) Recep Tayyip Erdogan called the work a "freak" and an "abomination" that needed to be demolished and replaced with "a beautiful park." Demolition of the two giant figures facing each other, hands extended in a gesture of peace, duly began in April of that year, with their decapitation.

"It cost more money to destroy the monument than to build," observed former mayor Naif Alibeyoglu.

Such actions run counter to the recent softening in Turkey's official stance — last year, Erdogan went as far as to offer an apology of sorts when he acknowledged the suffering endured by the Armenians in a statement made that April 24.

Using the word "genocide" is no longer a criminal offense in Turkey. Yet, Turkey's sustained efforts to suppress commemorative monuments are "a pernicious kind of aggression against our right to remember, to celebrate the fact that we are still alive," said Heghnar Zeitlian Watenpaugh, an art historian at the University of California, in an email interview with Al-Monitor. Should Ankara succeed in permanently switching off Geneva's "Streetlights of Memory," the wounds of the past will be even harder to heal.

Armenians come to USA and try to compare it with Armenia, remember Armenian warmness, friendship, moral and spiritual values. They miss everything, but still living here. They love their country from far away. Why?

While working in Europe I met an Armenian woman, who became my book's first heroine. It's already more than 20 years since she came, she has her own clinic, houses, she lives wealthy, but still missing Armenia, she doesn't want to sell her house in Yerevan and she will not go back as well.

When I asked why she doesn't want to go back to Armenia, she replied that she can't and doesn't want to live in a country where the law is nothing.

Due to my profession I used to talk to a lot of very different people. After arriving I met a smiley, nice and very cheerful woman- Varduhi Jahalriyan. I liked the house but I was standing confused and didn't know what to do, because during the last 2 days I had lost all my money and that time I was in a very stupid situation in a foreign country.

But her attitude gave me a courage and I announced that I can't pay my rent for the moment, so I can only give her one, I think the most expensive, family jewelry that I have. She looked at me and said: "Live as much as you want. Humanity is not lost yet". I think you can imagine how hard can be such a situation for a woman in a foreign country and without a place to live. I couldn't hide my excitement. My soul was storming with the feelings of happiness and gratitude.

After a while Varduhi brought me the first necessary things for living and also organized a dinner for me. Not only Varduhi, but also her aunt Gegharpi, a 75 years old woman with a light of kindness on her face, and Varduhi's sister Manush Akhoyan did everything to help me to feel comfortable bringing sofa, chairs, TV, etc. They surrounded me with care, love and

warmness. I was feeling me happy and calm.

In America without a car it's like without feet. Public transport works not very well and not everywhere. So I hadn't a chance to access it.

So Varduhi accompanied me everywhere, helped to solve my document problems in the governmental organizations and also translated my speech when I needed it.

Varduhi who has already become my close friend has 2 wonderful children – Hasmik and Raffie. Both of them are polite, smart, organized and with high moral values. In that short period I loved them a lot, I found a family on the other side of the ocean, where soars love and kindness.

Appreciation is the highest human quality and this Christmas time I appreciate everything. I want Varduhi's home to be filled with joy, child laugh, and even though she has given her life to her children, I want to see knocking on her door that strange and familiar feeling of love. I want her to meet the morning with new love, cause only love can save the world.

And finally, in the end as a conclusion I would like to say -Thank you!"-was telling me Saten her story. She was excited and thankful, and I was comparing her with hundreds of people that I know and felt for a moment that the world is wonderful and humanity still living here.

I met Varduhi, Saten... and that's enough to prove it.

Preparing to see in 2015: New Year, old traditions in Armenia

Red, blue, green, lemon green, white... They say these colors will be the colors of 2015, the Year of the Blue Wooden Goat according to the Chinese zodiac. Astrologists say the year is going to be peaceful and fruitful, a year of will and persistence and finding new ways.

Despite the financial hardships in 2014, especially at the end of the year when amid a period of currency market volatility and rising prices many Armenians even thought of cutting their traditional New Year celebration expenses, the starting holiday season promises to be no less abundant than the previous ones.

Supermarkets and stores in capital Yerevan and in the provinces are crowded in the days leading up to the New Year Feast as people make purchases for what is going to be a nearly two-week "marathon" of celebration and hospitality with a lot of eating, drinking, visiting and hosting each other.

Chef and poetess Sonia Tashchyan reminds everyone of what Armenians traditionally used to have on their tables for the New Year: pasuts tolma, roasted grains of wheat, dried fruits, the goods remaining from the previous year's yield, which is supposed to contribute to good crops also in the New Year.

Meanwhile, the central meals on Armenian New Year tables today are a pork leg and a turkey. There have been anecdotal reports about crocodile meat increasingly becoming a competitor as it sells at Yerevan supermarkets at a price of about \$1,000 a kilo today (whereas last year it was only \$770). Inflation!

The Armenian Apostolic Church celebrates Holy Nativity on January 6 and the period of the New Year celebration also coincides with the Christmas Fast.

"After the adoption of Christianity our New Year table has been a table of Christmas fasting," Tashchyan reminds, adding that dishes included various salads of beans, sorrels, pastries, etc., but no meat.

"Of course, in some regions they also put ghapama (a stuffed pumpkin dish) on the New Year table," she says, stressing that concentrating on eating and drinking only diminishes the true meaning and joy of the New Year celebration.
