

European Parliament condemns destruction of Armenian cultural heritage in Artsakh by Azerbaijan

The European Parliament voted 635 to 2 with 42 abstentions to adopt a resolution on the Destruction of Cultural Heritage in Nagorno Karabakh.

In the Resolution the European Parliament condemns the destruction of cultural heritage in Nagorno-Karabakh and calls for its immediate protection.

The MEPs stress that there is a universal dimension of cultural heritage as a testimony of history inseparable from peoples' identity, which the international community has to protect and preserve for future generations.

They also recall that historical revisionism and the defacement and destruction of cultural or religious heritage run counter to the decision of the ICJ of 7 December 2021, as well as with the European Parliament resolution of 21 May 2021.

The Parliament underlines that the measures indicated in

the Orders of the International Court of Justice of 7 December 2021 have to be taken without delay; stresses that if there are any new cases of destruction of cultural heritage they should be addressed immediately by the international community;

The European Parliament also welcomes the proposal of UNESCO to send an independent expert mission and calls for sending the mission without delay; stresses that an unhindered access to all cultural sites must be granted by Azerbaijan in order for the mission to make an inventory on the ground and to see what happened to the sites. It calls on the EU, UNESCO, the Council of Europe, and the OSCE to jointly encourage and support efforts aimed at safeguarding cultural and religious heritage.

The MEPs call on the European Commission to use all available levers to prevent acts of vandalism, destruction or alteration of cultural heritage in Nagorno-Karabakh.

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PM Pashinyan receives OSCE Representative on Freedom of the Media

Prime Minister Nikol Pashinyan received a delegation led by OSCE Representative on Freedom of the Media Theresa Ribeiro.

The Prime Minister attached importance to the cooperation of the Government of the Republic of Armenia “with the OSCE in order to effectively promote democratic reforms in the country.

Nikol Pashinyan noted that many reforms have been carried out in recent years to develop and strengthen democracy in Armenia, including in close cooperation with European partners, and that agenda remains one of the government’s priorities.

The Prime Minister underlined the consistent steps taken in the fight against corruption, noting that our country has made significant progress in the indexes of au-



thoritative international organizations.

The Prime Minister also pointed to the positive changes in the field of press freedom since 2018, noting that in recent years most of the media in Armenia, including television, are pro-opposition. The Prime Minister added that the reforms in the field of press freedom are carried out taking into account the international practice, experi-

ence and standards.

The OSCE Representative on Freedom of the Media, Theresa Ribeiro, noted that the steps taken by the Armenian government to strengthen democracy are encouraging and commendable. Theresa Ribeiro stressed the importance of effective cooperation between the OSCE and the Government of the Republic of Armenia in the field of freedom of speech, including the introduction of new tools in the fight against misinformation.

Ms. Ribeiro noted that the OSCE is ready to facilitate the exchange of experience of journalists and the development of professional skills. The importance of close cooperation between the government and civil society was also stressed.

Armenian FM briefs EU’s Borrell on ceasefire violations by Azerbaijan

On the sidelines of the Antalya Diplomacy Forum, Armenian Foreign Minister Ararat Mirzoyan met with Josep Borrell, EU High Representative for Foreign and Security Policy Josep Borrell.

The interlocutors hailed the dynamic development of the Armenia-EU partnership.

Reference was made to the humanitarian situation in Artsakh. In this regard, Minister Mirzoyan stressed the need for immediate repatriation of Armenian prisoners of war and civilians legally held hostage in Azerbaijan, provision of unimpeded

access to international humanitarian organizations to Nagorno-Karabakh, the need to preserve the Armenian cultural and religious heritage in the territories under the control of Azerbaijan.

Ararat Mirzoyan presented the situation on the Armenia-Azerbaijan border, the situation in Nagorno-Karabakh as a result of ceasefire violations by Azerbaijan, drew the colleague’s attention to the attempts of the Azerbaijani side to exert psychological pressure on the civilian population in Artsakh, to create artificial problems in restoring vital infrastructure.



Both sides attached importance to taking measures to de-escalate the situation. The parties exchanged views on the process of normalization of relations between Armenia and Turkey.

The interlocutors also touched upon regional and international security and stability issues.



On the margins of the Antalya Diplomacy Forum, Foreign Minister of Armenia Ararat Mirzoyan met with the Minister of European and Foreign Affairs of Austria Alexander Schallenberg.

Ministers Mirzoyan and Schallenberg touched upon the agenda of cooperation between Armenia and Austria.

Armenian FM briefs Austrian counterpart on Azerbaijani provocations

In the context of regional security and stability issues, Minister Mirzoyan drew the attention of his counterpart to provocative actions and regular ceasefire violations by the Azerbaijani armed forces in Nagorno-Karabakh and Armenia-Azerbaijan bordering area, as well as to the facts of exerting psychological pressure against the civilian population in Artsakh and creating artificial obstacles for rehabilitation of vital infrastructures.

The need for a comprehensive and last-

ing settlement of the Nagorno-Karabakh conflict under the mandate of the OSCE Minsk Group Co-Chairmanship was underscored.

The interlocutors exchanged views on the process of normalization of relations without preconditions between Armenia and Turkey.

Other international agenda issues of common interest were also discussed.

Prime Minister Pashinyan and President Macron meet at the Élysée Palace



Prime Minister Nikol Pashinyan met with French President Emmanuel Macron at the Élysée Palace.

During the private conversation, the interlocutors highlighted the holding of the “Ambitions: Armenia-France” conference in Paris, expressing confidence that it will give a new impetus to the development and expansion of bilateral cooperation in the fields of economy, infrastructure, tourism, health, education, science and culture.

The sides stressed that the Armenian-French cooperation based on mutual trust and friendship will soon develop with a new impetus, with discussions and implementation of various joint projects.

Prime Minister Pashinyan noted that the Armenian government is interested in

the expansion of the presence of French business in the Armenian market. Cooperation in economic sectors such as infrastructure, tourism, reservoir construction, agriculture, etc. was highlighted.

Emmanuel Macron stressed France’s readiness and interest in deepening ties



with friendly Armenia in economic and humanitarian spheres.

During the meeting, the interlocutors also discussed the situation around Nagorno Karabakh. The Prime Minister considered inadmissible any attempt to escalate the situation, noting that Azerbaijan

continues provocative actions both in Artsakh and on the Armenian-Azerbaijani border, as a result of which the Armenian side suffered two casualties, one victim and one injured on March 7.

The interlocutors highlighted the comprehensive settlement of the Nagorno-Karabakh conflict within the framework of the OSCE Minsk Group Co-chairs’ format and the implementation of the trilateral statements signed after the 44-day war.

Nikol Pashinyan and Emmanuel Macron also referred to the processes taking place in the international arena.



Foreign Ministers of Armenia and Turkey meet in Antalya

Armenian Foreign Minister Ararat Mirzoyan and Turkish Foreign Minister Mevlut Cavusoglu held a meeting on March 12.

The negotiations took place on the sidelines of the second Diplomacy Forum in Antalya and lasted about half an hour. The ways of normalizing relations between Ankara and Yerevan were discussed.

“We had a very productive and constructive meeting,” Cavusoglu told reporters.

“Everyone will benefit from the establishment of peace and stability in the region, and we will continue to make efforts in that direction,” he said. “I and Mr. Mirzoyan agreed on this issue.”

“During the meeting we reaffirmed the readiness of the two sides to continue, without any preconditions, the normaliza-



tion process for the purpose of establishing [diplomatic] relations and opening border,” Mirzoyan said, for his part. “Our two representatives are working on this.”

Neither minister announced concrete understandings reached by them.

Mirzoyan last month voiced cautious optimism over the success of the Turkish-Armenian dialogue welcomed by the United States, the European Union and Russia.

Cavusoglu said on March 12 that Azer-

baijan is also “content” with the dialogue. Azerbaijani Foreign Minister Jeyhun Bayramov was also attending the Antalya conference.

Ankara has for decades linked the establishment of diplomatic relations with Yerevan and the opening of the Turkish-Armenian border to a resolution of the Nagorno-Karabakh conflict acceptable to Azerbaijan. Cavusoglu has repeatedly made clear that his government will coordinate the Turkish-Armenian normalization talks with Baku.



Vahagn Khachaturyan sworn in as fifth President of Armenia

Vahagn Khachaturyan, an economist and veteran politician, pledged to “spare no effort to strengthen national unity” as he was sworn in as Armenia’s new president on March 13.

The inauguration ceremony took place at a special session of the Armenian parliament boycotted by its two opposition factions.

After 2015 amendments in Armenia’s constitution transforming it into a parliamentary republic the country’s president has largely ceremonial powers. Still, the president is considered to be the head of state.

Khachaturyan was nominated for presidency by Prime Minister Nikol Pashinyan’s ruling Civil Contract party after a sudden resignation in January by Armen Sarkissian, who had occupied the post of

the country’s president since 2018.

Civil Contract’s faction in parliament later installed Khachaturyan as president in a two-round vote boycotted by the opposition Hayastan and Pativ Unem factions.

In his speech on March 13 Khachaturyan acknowledged that he was assuming office at a pivotal time for Armenia amid “complicated regional and international challenges.”

“We are witnessing rapidly changing geopolitical developments as a result of which current global security systems are being transformed. Today, more than ever, we need wisdom, confidence, stability and unity,” the new Armenian president said.

The swearing-in was followed by the national anthem of Armenia, and remarks and blessings from Catholicos of All Armenians Garegin II.



The President’s inauguration ceremony was attended by Prime Minister Nikol Pashinyan, Acting President Alen Simonyan, ministers, President of the Republic of Artsakh Arayik Harutyunyan, foreign Ambassadors, NGO representatives, etc.

Under Armenia’s constitution, the president is elected for a term of seven years and the same person may not be elected as president more than once.



The United States mourns the death of the Armenian servicemember Hrach Manasyan on March 7, Deputy Chief of US Mission to the OSCE Courtney Austrian said in a statement.

“This tragic and avoidable death underscores the need for greater restraint, for

forces to distance themselves from each other in the contested border areas, and for intensified diplomatic engagement to find comprehensive solutions to all outstanding issues,” she noted.

“We urge the parties to make progress on humanitarian issues such as the full release of all remaining detainees, sharing information to identify the fate of missing persons, humanitarian demining, and moving forward on investigations of alleged human rights abuses and violations of international human-

itarian law,” Courtney Austrian added.

She noted that the United States has contributed \$5 million in humanitarian assistance this year to support conflict-affected populations in both Armenia and Azerbaijan.

“The United States further remains committed to promoting a secure, stable, democratic, prosperous, and peaceful future for the South Caucasus,” the Deputy Chief of Mission stated.

The EU supports normalization of relations between Armenia and Turkey. Toivo Klaar

The European Union fully supports the process of normalization of relations between Armenia and Turkey, EU Special Representative for the South Caucasus and the Crisis in Georgia Toivo Klaar wrote on his Twitter page.

Referring to the March 12 meeting between Armenian Foreign Minister Ararat Mirzoyan and Turkish Foreign Minister Mevlüt Çavuşoğlu, he wrote, “The meeting of Mevlüt Çavuşoğlu and Ararat Mirzoyan within the framework of the Antalya

Diplomacy Forum is promising. The European Union fully supports the normalization of relations between Turkey and Armenia”.

On March 12, Armenian FM Ararat Mirzoyan met with Turkish Foreign Minister Mevlüt Çavuşoğlu within the framework of the Antalya Diplomacy Forum. The Foreign Ministers reaffirmed their readiness to carry out the process of full normalization of relations between Armenia and Turkey and the establishment of



good-neighborly relations without preconditions. They agreed that the normalization is necessary for the whole region.

Azerbaijan taking advantage of situation in Ukraine to escalate tensions on Armenia border and in Artsakh – Ambassador



Azerbaijan is taking advantage of the situation in Ukraine, trying to escalate the situation near the border with Armenia and in Nagorno Karabakh (Artsakh), Armenia's Ambassador to Greece Tigran Mkrtchyan said in an interview with *TV100 Thessaloniki*.

“Over the past two weeks we have seen ceasefire violations in various points, including the borders with Armenia, where a soldier was killed a few days ago. Snipers are being used against Armenian villagers. Just last night the Azerbaijani forces

shelled the villages in Nagorno Karabakh, terrorizing people living there,” the Ambassador said.

He noted that Azerbaijanis are also using loudspeakers to warn people to leave the areas. He also referred to the blasting of the main gas pipeline, supplying gas to 120 000 Armenians living in Nagorno Karabakh.


Another issue the Ambassador pointed to is the destruction of cultural heritage. “Armenians have been living in Nagorno Karabakh for thousands of years, and there are a number of Armenian churches, cathedrals, architectural masterpieces there, and after the signing of the trilateral statement on November 9 the Azerbaijani side has been trying to distort or eliminate the Armenian cultural heritage wherever it's possible,” Ambassador Mkrtchyan said.

Speaking about the prospects of Arme-

nian-Turkish normalization, the Ambassador said “nobody is forgetting or putting aside the importance of recognition of the Armenian Genocide, but the sides have agreed to move forward without preconditions.

“There have been two meetings between special envoys, and after both meetings the Foreign Ministries of the two countries have said in press releases that the process is moving forward without preconditions. This is basically the first time Turkey has embraced this approach, which has been the line of the Armenian side for three decades. We have been saying for three decades that we are ready to negotiate the opening of the border and establishment of diplomatic relations without preconditions. It is Turkey that has been continuously putting preconditions,” Tigran Mkrtchyan said.

Armenia could apply to Minsk Group Co-chairs to initiate peace talks with Azerbaijan – MFA



Armenia may soon apply to the OSCE Minsk Group Co-Chairs to initiate peace

negotiations with Azerbaijan, Vahan Hunanyan, spokesperson for the Foreign Ministry of Armenia, said in comments to Armenpress.

Armenia has repeatedly stated its readiness to sign a peace treaty with Azerbaijan, similar statements have also been made by Azerbaijan.

“The signing of the agreement should be surely preceded by a negotiation pro-

cess. Since mutual statements have not yet developed into a concrete negotiation process, as the two countries do not have rich experience of direct negotiations, Armenia will probably apply to the mediators – the OSCE Minsk Group Co-Chairs – in the near future to initiate the peace negotiations with Azerbaijan. The issue is currently being elaborated,” Hunanyan said.

Nikol Pashinyan, Charles Michel hold informal meeting in Paris

Prime Minister Nikol Pashinyan had an informal meeting with European Council President Charles Michel in Paris.

The interlocutors discussed various issues on the agenda of Armenia-European Union cooperation.

The situation around Nagorno Karabakh was touched upon. The Prime Minister presented the current situation in



Artsakh and on the Armenian-Azerbaijani border and considered inadmissible the continuing provocative actions by Azerbaijan in the recent days.

The parties also exchanged views on the processes taking place in the international arena.

“The food security issues of Armenia are under the direct control of the Armenian government,” the Minister said, commenting on recent information in the

No deficit of products in minimum food basket projected in Armenia

Russian and Armenian media, according to which it is planned to restrict the export of a number of food products from Russia to the EAEU countries, I inform that

So far, he said, the Russian government has not approved a decision to ban the export of food products, so the import of goods to Armenia is carried out normally.

“There is currently no projected deficit in the Republic of Armenia in terms of products included in the minimum food basket. We keep in touch with our Russian partners, even in the event of a decision by

the Russian government on possible export restrictions, the Republic of Armenia has all the necessary resources to ensure the food security of the population,” he said.

The grain self-sufficiency of the Russian Federation is about 150%, which means that Russia has sufficient resources for domestic consumption and export, Vahan Kerobyan said.

He called on the citizens not to cause panic and not to make unnecessary purchases.

1% economic decline in Russia could lead to 0,7% drop in Armenia, warns expert

According to assessments of various international organizations the sanctions against Russia could lead to 6-10% economic decline, and Armenia will also be impacted, expert Meri Hovsepyan from the Amberd Analytical Center said at a press conference.

“Naturally Armenia will also be impacted given the fact that Russia is our main trade-economic partner. Recently Amberd Analytical Center released expert assessments according to which 1% economic decline in Russia could lead to 0,7% decline in Armenia. This means that if a 6-10% decline was to happen in Russia, the



decline in Armenia could be around 4-6%,” she said.

Hovsepyan added that the sanctions against Russia have impacted Armenia’s exports because supply chains are disrupted, in some cases also suspended,

which created risks and obstacles for Armenian exporters.

“In addition, we will see the impact in the form of transfers and investments. And naturally in the context of this all the transfer volume will drop,” Hovsepyan said.

The expert also drew attention on the issue of food security, noting that the EAEU countries have already implemented procurements for the 2021-22 season and if in that period any member-state, including Armenia, were to have the need for additional imports then this could be done through a licensed process.

Russia lifts Covid-related restriction on flights to Armenia and seven other countries



Russia is lifting restrictions imposed due to COVID-19 on irregular and scheduled flights to Azerbaijan, Armenia,

Kazakhstan, Kyrgyzstan, Tajikistan, Turkmenistan, Uzbekistan and Iran on a reciprocal basis, the press service of the Federal Air Transport Agency said.

“On March 9, 2022, in accordance with the decision of the government of the Russian Federation, restrictions on irregular and regular flights to Azerbaijan, Armenia, Kazakhstan, Kyrgyzstan, Tajikistan, Turkmenistan, Uzbekistan and Iran, previously introduced as part of preventing the spread of COVID-19, have been lifted,” the mes-

sage reads.

Earlier, Covid restrictions on flights to Belarus, the Dominican Republic, Egypt (except Cairo), the United Arab Emirates, Turkey, Finland, the Czech Republic, Switzerland, South Korea and Cuba were also completely lifted.

Flights to these countries are now limited only by the provisions of intergovernmental agreements on air traffic and separate agreements between the countries' aviation authorities.

France's Macron vows closer ties with Armenia



(RFE/RL) - French President Emmanuel Macron on March 9 pledged to increase economic aid to Armenia and deepen broader French-Armenian relations in the face of what he called destabilizing effects of Russia's invasion of Ukraine.

Macron denounced Moscow's "historical revisionism" and "imperial dreams" as he addressed a French-Armenian cooperation forum in Paris after holding talks with Armenian Prime Minister Nikol Pashinyan.

The two leaders made a joint appearance at the concluding session of the day-long event organized by their governments.

"What is happening in Ukraine today is not without consequences for the rest of the region and not without consequences for Armenia," Macron declared in his speech. "So, we are extremely vigilant about that."

"As this war unleashed by Russia is destabilizing your immediate neighborhood, Mr. Prime Minister, I also want to communicate to you France's commitment to bring peace to Ukraine and to continue encouraging lasting stability in the Caucasus," he told Pashinyan, whose country remains Russia's closest regional ally.

Armenia has not condemned the assault on Ukraine or joined the Western sanctions against Russia. The South Caucasus state's heavy dependence on Moscow for defense and security has deepened further after its

defeat in the 2020 war with Azerbaijan.

Macron mentioned the six-week war and said the conflict in Ukraine "must



not make us forget" other international hotspots such as Nagorno-Karabakh. France, he said, will continue to press for the release of Armenian prisoners of war still held by Azerbaijan, support the opening of Armenian-Azerbaijani transport links and strive for a comprehensive resolution of the Karabakh conflict.

According to an Armenian government statement, the conflict was high on the agenda of Pashinyan's talks with Macron held earlier in the day. The Armenian premier was reported to blame Azerbaijan for

recent days' upsurge in truce violations in Karabakh and on the Armenian-Azerbaijani border, which left one Armenian soldier dead.

Macron spoke of "worrying events" in the conflict zone in his speech at the Paris forum held days after the official start of his reelection campaign.

The first round of France's tightly contested presidential elections is slated for April. Macron and other major presidential candidates are seen as vying for the votes of France's influential Armenian community. Two of them, conservative politician Valerie Pécresse and far-right commentator Eric Zemmour, visited Armenia late last year.

Macron said that the French-Armenian forum marks "the start of a process that will reinforce our bilateral cooperation, our commitment to Armenia and our will to

work together." The two governments have worked out a "French-Armenian economic roadmap" for the next five years and are also planning more joint projects that will benefit Armenia's public infrastructures, healthcare system and cultural and historical heritage, he said.

Macron also announced that the French government will set up a special fund for wide-ranging assistance to Armenia. He urged French regions and charities to contribute to the fund.

A US bill requires a report on the likelihood of military action against Artsakh. Armenian Assembly of America

On March 10 the U.S. House of Representatives passed an Omnibus Appropriations Bill wrapping up Fiscal Year 2022 spending that calls for “not less than” \$45 million for Armenia and \$2 million for humanitarian demining in Artsakh, the Armenian Assembly of America informs.

The measure also requires “that prior to any initial obligation of funds appropriated under title IV of the Act for assistance for Armenia and Azerbaijan, the Secretary of State shall consult with the Committees on Appropriations on the proposed uses of such funds.”

The inclusion of aid comes on the heels of a letter spearheaded by Congressional Armenian Caucus Vice-Chair Rep. Adam Schiff (D-CA) along with Armenian Caucus Co-Chairs Rep. Frank Pallone, Jr. (D-NJ), and Rep. Jackie Speier (D-CA), as well as another letter by Caucus Members Anna Eshoo (D-CA) and Jim Costa (D-CA), who urged the leadership of the House and Senate Appropriations Subcommittees on State, Foreign Operations, and Related Programs to include an additional \$50 million in humanitarian aid to Artsakh.

The bill itself includes language on Section 907 of the FREEDOM Support Act, and also requires a report on the likelihood of military action against Artsakh “not later than 90 days after the date of the enactment of this Act.”

There has been widespread reporting of the Aliyev regime’s continued vi-

olations of the November 2020 ceasefire terms, including the killing of Armenians in cross-border shootings. This week alone, Azeri forces blocked repair of damaged main gas supply to Nagorno Karabakh amid reports that they cut the pipeline themselves, under cover of war in Ukraine. Just yesterday, an Armenian soldier was killed, and another wounded, in a ceasefire violation on the border between Armenia and Azerbaijan’s Nakhichevan exclave. In addition, Artsakh officials have reported today that Azerbaijan’s army is “actively” using high-caliber mortars and automatic weapons to target Artsakh’s rural communities forcing farmers to suspend “all types of agricultural work.” Moreover, for the last two days and counting, the people of Artsakh have been deprived of a vital gas supply pipeline while the Azeri military refuses access to determine the cause or fix the damage. Meanwhile, Artsakh recently sent over 14 tons of humanitarian aid to help aid the Ukrainian people.

Last week, Senator Robert Menendez (D-NJ), Chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, released a report regarding Section 907 of the FREEDOM Support Act by the Government Accounting Office (GAO) which found that, according to Chairman Menendez, “the State Department failed to comply with reporting requirements for reviewing U.S. assistance to the Government of Azerbaijan.”

Further, according to Chairman Me-

nendez, the GAO report “found that over several years, the Department of State and Department of Defense failed to meet statutory reporting requirements to Congress on the impact of U.S. assistance on the military balance between Armenia and Azerbaijan.”

Other key findings from the report included that the State’s reporting to Congress from FY2014-FY2021 did not address required elements, including the impact on proposed assistance on the military balance between Armenia and Azerbaijan; State’s Memorandums of Justification contained limited or no details regarding quantity of assistance, status of the military balance between Armenia and Azerbaijan, the impact of U.S. assistance on the military balance, or the impact of the assistance on peace negotiations; State’s 2021 guidance did not provide detailed instructions to agencies about reporting requirements to Congress; and that State and DoD did not document their consideration of waiver requirements from FY2014-FY2020, including how they determined assistance would not be used for offensive purposes against Armenia.

“As the world bears witness to the ongoing devastation in Ukraine, we urge continued vigilance to hold Azerbaijan accountable for its ongoing attacks against the Armenian people,” said Assembly Congressional Relations Director Mariam Khaloyan.

Armenian Ombudswoman calls on int’l organizations to clearly respond to Azerbaijan’s criminal behavior

It has been for over a week, the Azerbaijani side is not allowing the representatives of Artsakh to restore the alleged “disruption” of the gas pipeline, Human Rights Defender of Armenia said in a statement, adding that as a result, more than 100.000 people have been deprived of heating in cold weather conditions.

“In parallel, the electricity is being regularly cut. This further worsens the difficult humanitarian conditions which has been emerged during and after the war.

As a result, hospitals, schools, kindergartens, temporary shelters for displaced persons are deprived of their basic living

conditions; it is impossible to exercise the right to health care of people, and the right of children to education.

Moreover, it has been a week since the Azerbaijani military forces have been shooting intensively in the direction of the peaceful villages of Artsakh; Khramort village and Askeran city of Askeran region, and Karmir Shuka and Khnushinak villages of Martuni region. In Khramort village, a peaceful civilian was injured.

All these are aimed at maintaining an atmosphere of fear and terror among the people living in Artsakh, with ultimate aim of making Armenians to leave and annihi-

late Artsakh from its indigenous Armenian population”, the Ombudswoman said.

“I strongly condemn the ongoing criminal policy of the Azerbaijani state. I call on international organizations to clearly respond to the situation and to increase the pressure on Azerbaijan to stop this criminal behavior.

Human Rights are universal, and they should be viewed outside the geopolitical framework.

This statement has been sent to international organizations and diplomatic missions”, she said.

Azerbaijani forces use 120mm mortars as they target school area in Khnapat, Artsakh

The Azerbaijani armed forces used a mortar as they fired in the direction of Khnapat village, while in Taghavard they once again called to leave the village through a loudspeaker, Artsakh Police inform.

According to preliminary data, at around 10:20 am today, the Azerbaijani side fired two shells from 120-mm mortars in the direction of the school area of



Khnapat village in Askeran region. No casualties are reported.

The Police report that from positions near the village of Taghavard in Martuni region, the Azerbaijani forces are calling on residents to leave.

Materials are being prepared in the regional police departments.

Senator Bob Menendez calls out State and Defense Departments for covering up impact of US military aid to Azerbaijan

Senate Foreign Relations Committee Chair Bob Menendez (D-NJ) pressed the Departments of State and Defense on the Administration's failure to meet statutory reporting requirements to Congress on the impact of U.S. assistance on the military balance between Armenia and Azerbaijan, as mandated by Section 907 of the FREEDOM Support Act, reported the Armenian National Committee of America (ANCA).

"It's deeply concerning as Azerbaijan's actions in the Nagorno-Karabakh region have led to the deaths of more than 6000 people extracted a steep toll on Armenians, uprooting them from others thousands from their homes," stated Chairman Menendez during a Senate Foreign Relations Committee hearing earlier today, which featured testimony by Department of Defense Assistant Secretary for Strategy, Plans, and Capabilities Dr. Mara Karlin and State Department Assistant Secretary for Political-Military Affairs Jessica Lewis.

Referencing a Government Accountability Office (GAO) report, released last week, which revealed that the State Department consistently failed to inform Congress of the impact of over \$164 million in assistance to Baku on the military balance between Azerbaijan and Armenia, Sen. Menendez asked Secretary Lewis: "do you commit to review State's compliance with the nine or seven waiver requirements for providing assistance to Azerbaijan?"

Secretary Lewis responded, "it's a priority for me to look into that and ensure that we provide the information required."

Sen. Menendez continued, "I don't want to see this anymore. I shouldn't have had to commission a report to get what we



all know that there has been a failure to justify this assistance."

"We join with Senator Menendez in demanding answers and accountability," ANCA National Board Member and New Jersey resident Ani Tchaghlasian. "Our Congress, our community, and our coalition partners deserve full transparency regarding the U.S. laws that have been bent and broken in recklessly shipping tens of millions of U.S. tax dollars to Azerbaijan's violently anti-Armenian Aliyev regime."

Congressional Armenian Caucus Co-Chair and House Armed Services Committee Member Rep. Jackie Speier (D-CA) shared similar concerns on March 1st during a committee hearing featuring Assistant Secretary Lewis and Assistant Secretary Karlin.

"Between 2018 and 2020, the country of Azerbaijan received \$120 million in Section 333 partner capacity-building funds despite its authoritarian government and armed aggression towards its democratic neighbor, Armenia," stated Rep. Speier. "In contrast, Armenia received zero dollars during that same period. So, Secretary Karlin, you testified that the department seeks to 'cultivate security partners who can appropriately and effectively be regional security anchors, especially during crises.' Given the conflict in Nagorno

Karabakh in which Azerbaijan initiated it and it costs thousands of lives and hundreds of thousands of people being displaced. I mean, I don't think anyone could argue that Azerbaijan has lived up to that ideal."

After some evasive answers, the State Department and Defense Department representatives offered to respond to Rep. Speier in writing "to ensure that they are really meeting the intent of her important question."

Adopted in 1992, Section 907 of the FREEDOM Support Act restricts U.S. assistance to Azerbaijan until that country takes demonstrable steps to end its aggression and lift its blockades against Armenia and Artsakh (Nagorno Karabakh). In 2002, the President was given waiver authority of Section 907, if they determined and certified that, among other items, providing US assistance will not "undermine or hamper ongoing efforts to negotiate a peaceful settlement between Armenia and Azerbaijan or be used for offensive purposes against Armenia." Section 907 has been waived annually since then.

The waiver authority requires that State submit a report to appropriate congressional committees within 60 days of exercising the waiver, specifying (1) the nature and quantity of all training and assistance provided to the government of Azerbaijan pursuant to the waiver, (2) the status of the military balance between Azerbaijan and Armenia and the impact of U.S. assistance on that balance, and (3) the status of negotiations for a peaceful settlement between Armenia and Azerbaijan and the impact of the U.S. assistance on those negotiations. The statute also requires consultation with the Committees on Appropriations prior to the provision of assistance made available pursuant to the waiver.

Azerbaijan continues to violate international humanitarian law, Armenian envoy tells UN Human Rights Council

In an address to the UN Human Rights Council, Armenia's Permanent Representative Andranik Hovhannisyan expressed grave concern about non-compliance of Azerbaijan with its international obligations in the context of the Nagorno-Karabakh conflict.



He pointed to the extrajudicial execution of Armenians by Azerbaijani armed forces that may amount to a war crime, enforced disappearances, arbitrary detentions, cruel, inhumane and degrading treatment of Armenians, destruction of religious and cultural heritage.

“On November 2021 Azerbaijan announced an amnesty for all those who participated in the war against Nagorno-Karabakh conveniently putting to rest even the theoretical possibilities for accountability on the crimes identified by the OHCHR and Special procedures. In another worrying move Azerbaijan announced about its decision to review, revise and effectively deface the cultural heritage of Nagorno-Karabakh. With a number of monuments of Armenian cultural and religious heritage destroyed, vandalized and misappropriated this new decision may result in total elimination of what is left,” Amb. Hovhannisyan noted.

The International Court of Justice has recently obliged Azerbaijan to protect Armenian detainees and ensure their equality before the law; to prevent anti-Armenian incitement and promotion of racial hatred, including by the officials; and to take necessary measures to prevent and punish acts

of destruction of Armenian cultural heritage. Azerbaijan blatantly ignores all these measures prescribed by the ICJ.

“In these circumstances Armenia believes that the High Commissioner should receive unconditional and unimpeded access to Nagorno-Karabakh as she has requested a year ago,” the envoy added.

“Armenia is convinced that non-politicized, constructive, open and inclusive debates are essential for the promotion and protection of human rights,” he noted.

“Armenia will keep persistently communicating that the Nagorno-Karabakh conflict is not a religious one and it cannot be anointed in religious terms. Armenia strongly believes that human rights are universal and are not limited to religious affiliations,” Andranik Hovhannisyan stressed.

When it comes to Armenia, he said “we reiterate that the adoption of the peace treaty is among the priorities of the Government.”

“The sanctimonious talks of peace that representatives of Azerbaijan pursue in the high-end salons around the globe are not matched with the corresponding appropriate actions on the ground,” the Ambassador said, reminding that on March 7, sergeant

Hrach Manasaryan of the Armenian Armed Forces was killed by Azerbaijani forces.

“Azerbaijan continues to violate the letter and spirit of the international humanitarian law by keeping hostage the combatant and civilian detainees that should have been released and repatriated long ago without any preconditions. Azerbaijan

weaponizes their suffering, unlawful and arbitrary detention to drive a bargain. It is coupled with the Government-induced and propagated extreme manifestation of intolerance and hate towards Armenians,” Amb. Hovhannisyan stated.

“It does not come as a surprise that the International Court of Justice has recently ordered Azerbaijan (and I quote) “to protect from violence and bodily harm all persons captured in relation to the 2020 Conflict who remain in detention, and ensure their security and equality before the law.” Obviously, Azerbaijan fails to implement this and other measures prescribed by the ICJ, which also violates the Court’s ruling to refrain from any action which might aggravate or extend the dispute,” he added.

He emphasized that Azerbaijan pursues an ethno-centric approach with the well-declared objective to force the indigent Armenian population out of their homeland.

“Impunity leads to new ethnically motivated crimes. Hence, Armenia calls not to turn a blind eye to Azerbaijan’s violations of the international humanitarian law and international human rights law,” he concluded.
