

Armenian, Turkish envoys meet in Yerevan



Armenia, Turkey agree to take steps toward launching Gyumri-Kars railway

On September 12, Special Representatives for the Normalization Process between Armenia and Türkiye, Deputy Speaker of the National Assembly of Armenia Ruben Rubinyan and Ambassador Serdar Kılıç held their sixth meeting in Yerevan.

At this meeting, the Special Representatives confirmed the issues they had worked and agreed on at previous meetings, in order to advance the full normalization process between Armenia and

Türkiye. In this context, they exchanged views on the implementation of the agreement on border crossings reached at their meeting on July 1, 2022. The Special Representatives agreed to expedite this process.

The Special Representatives also decided that the relevant authorities of both countries conduct the necessary technical studies for the rehabilitation and operationalization of the Gyumri-Kars railway and electricity interconnector.

They also decided that efforts should be made to strengthen cooperation in the

field of culture and academia, particularly by creating scholarship opportunities for higher education students and the joint renovation of the historical Ani/Silk Road bridge.

The Special Representatives also agreed to carry out the necessary work for other interested companies to start flights to various destinations starting in the summer of 2026, thereby increasing the number of air routes and flights between the two countries.

Finally, Special Representatives reiterated their commitment to continue this process without any preconditions.

Armenia dismisses reports linking Pakistan recognition to EAEU accession

The Armenian Ministry of Foreign Affairs has dismissed a report published by Russia's TASS news agency claiming that "Pakistan intends to recognize Armenia as a UN member state, which would give it the green light to join the Eurasian Economic Union (EAEU)."

In a statement to Armenpress, Foreign Ministry spokesperson Ani Badalyan stressed that the report was inaccurate.

"We inform uninformed sources that Armenia and Pakistan have already established diplomatic relations, in full accordance with the fundamental principles of the UN Charter. Accordingly, there is, of

course, no issue of 'recognition at the UN' on the agenda," Badalyan said.

She added that Armenia had already informed through diplomatic channels that the two countries would discuss expanding bilateral cooperation, as well as working together in multilateral platforms such as the Shanghai Cooperation Organization (SCO), the Eurasian Economic Union (EAEU), or other structures of mutual interest.

TASS, citing what it described as diplomatic sources, reported earlier that "Pakistan indeed plans to recognize Armenia as a UN member state and, in return, hopes to



receive consensus for its accession to the EAEU." According to the agency, the process could take several weeks to months, with one source noting that the Armenia-Azerbaijan peace talks had removed obstacles to such developments.

Armenia committed to advancing relations with France towards strategic partnership: Pashinyan congratulates Lecornu on appointment

Armenian Prime Minister Nikol Pashinyan has congratulated Sébastien Lecornu on his appointment as the new Prime Minister of France, expressing confidence in the continued development of close ties between the two nations.

"I warmly congratulate Sébastien Lecornu on his appointment as Prime Minister and extend my best wishes to him in this high mission in service of the



people of France," Pashinyan wrote on X (formerly Twitter).

The Armenian leader emphasized that Armenia remains committed to further strengthening Armenian-French relations and advancing them toward a strategic partnership.

President Emmanuel Macron has named close ally Sébastien Lecornu as the new French prime minister, 24 hours after a vote of confidence ousted François Bayrou as head of government

Armenian, Austrian security officials discuss regional developments



The Secretary of the Security Council of Armenia Armen Grigoryan met with Peter

Launsky, Austria's Special Envoy on Global Affairs, in Vienna, the Armenian Security Council's press office reported.

During the meeting, the officials exchanged views on further steps to ensure peace and stability in the South Caucasus. The Armenian Security Council Secretary highlighted issues related to regional connectivity and presented the Armenian government's "Crossroads of Peace" initiative,

emphasizing the importance of inclusivity in regional projects.

The sides also discussed key areas of bilateral cooperation and the progress of ongoing programs. In this context, they underscored the creation of broad economic opportunities as a result of regional unblocking and reaffirmed their readiness to expand bilateral cooperation within this framework.

Armenia reaffirms readiness to promptly sign peace agreement with Azerbaijan

The Armenian Foreign Ministry reiterated on Saturday its readiness to sign the peace agreement with Azerbaijan in the shortest time possible.

Foreign Ministry spokesperson Ani Badalyan, reacting to Turkish Foreign Minister Hakan Fidan's [statement](#) that he expects the Armenian-Azerbaijani treaty to be signed in the first half of 2026, told

Armenpress that Yerevan is ready to sign the agreement as soon as possible.

"When, on March 13 of this year, the finalization of the text of the Armenian-Azerbaijani agreement was announced, Armenia simultaneously expressed its readiness to swiftly sign the agreement. This approach was reaffirmed with the initialing of the agreement on August

8, which, as an important development marking the establishment of peace, received broad international support. Armenia's principled position regarding the signing date has not changed: signing the agreement within the shortest possible time frame would be a significant step toward the institutionalization of the established peace," Badalyan told Armenpress.

TRIPP project is matter of Armenia-US bilateral discussion: Pashinyan

Point 4 of the declaration on the “Trump Route,” signed in Washington on August 8, states that the TRIPP project is a matter of discussion between Armenia and the United States, Prime Minister Nikol Pashinyan said during a Q&A session with Cabinet members in parliament.

“Civil Contract” faction MP Arusyak Julhakyan noted that, following the August 8 Washington agreements, Azerbaijani President Ilham Aliyev once again used the term “Zangezur Corridor,” which contradicts the name “Trump Route” used in the declaration.

“There is an objective reality, and there are subjective perceptions. The objective reality is that Armenia and Azerbaijan have once again recognized each other’s territorial integrity, sovereignty, jurisdiction, and the inviolability of borders in Washington,” Pashinyan said.

The Prime Minister presented a photocopy of the declaration from Washington, which bears his signature confirming the creation of an infrastructure called TRIPP in Armenia.

“But that’s not the whole story. This protocol also has the signature of the



President of the United States. And that’s not the whole story either; it also bears the signature of the President of Azerbaijan,” Pashinyan said, adding that the three sides have defined the framework for regional communications and de-blockade.

He underlined that Point 4 of the document clearly states that the TRIPP project is an issue on the agenda of discussions between Armenia and the United States.

“The question will arise: what does Azerbaijan have to do with that topic? The connection is that the communications of Armenia and Azerbaijan should be interconnected. But the TRIPP project is a matter of bilateral discussion between Armenia and the United States. And it has the signature of not only the Prime Minister of Armenia and the President

of the United States, but also the President of Azerbaijan,” Pashinyan said.

He added that Armenia and the United States have signed a memorandum of intent on the development of the Crossroads of Peace project.

“Thereby, the United States and we have agreed that the project will be implemented based on the principle of Ar-

menia’s territorial integrity, sovereignty and inviolability of its borders. The United States is interested in investing there. This is the objective reality, the rest is subjective,” he said.

Pashinyan stressed that no infrastructure with the name mentioned by Aliyev can exist on Armenian territory.

“But I cannot exclude that this name has become so popular in Azerbaijan that any infrastructure passing through its territory, including those that should join the Trump Route, may be called by that name. But it has nothing to do with the sovereign territory of the Republic of Armenia, the agenda of the Republic of Armenia or the agreements reached in Washington,” the Prime Minister emphasized.

FM Mirzoyan, U.S. official discuss Washington agreements



Armenian Foreign Minister Ararat Mirzoyan on September 12 received Brendan Hanrahan, Senior Bureau Official for European and Eurasian Affairs at the U.S. State Department.

The sides discussed steps to further develop the Armenia-U.S. strategic partnership across all areas of interest. They also emphasized the implementation of the bilateral memorandums signed on August 8, as well as opportunities for innovative cooperation in energy, artificial intelligence and semiconductors.

In addition, Mirzoyan and Hanrahan addressed issues related to the trilateral declaration signed by the leaders of Armenia, Azerbaijan, and the United States in Washington, including the implementation

of the Trump Route for International Peace and Prosperity (TRIPP).

Both parties highlighted the importance of expanding communications and infrastructure networks based on agreed principles, in the context of regional peace and broader connectivity.

Minister Mirzoyan expressed appreciation for the ongoing support and efforts of the U.S.

The meeting also included an exchange of views on international and regional developments.

Armenian FM meets NATO Ambassadors, highlights peace efforts and democratic reforms



On September 12, Armenia's Foreign Minister Ararat Mirzoyan met with a delegation of permanent representatives of NATO member states.

During the meeting, Minister Mirzoyan outlined Armenia's approach to developing its partnership with NATO and its member countries, as well as the ongoing joint work being carried out in this direction. The sides also discussed existing opportunities for further cooperation.

Mirzoyan highlighted the agreements reached on August 8 in Washington as one of the most significant developments on the path toward peace in the region, informing the ambassadors about the ongoing discussions aimed at implementing

these agreements.

In the context of Armenia's foreign and security policy, the Foreign Minister presented Armenia's vision for strengthening democratic institutions and resilience amid a dynamically changing global environment, promoting stability in the South Caucasus, and advancing bilateral relations across multiple fields.

Mirzoyan also answered questions from the NATO ambassadors, and the sides exchanged views on current international developments.

Armenian interior minister, U.S. official discuss Trump Route

Minister of Internal Affairs Arpine Sargsyan has met with Brendan Hanrahan, the U.S. State Department's Senior Bureau Official for the Bureau of European and Eurasian Affairs.

Minister Sargsyan attached importance to the initialing of the Armenian-Azerbaijani peace agreement on August 8 through U.S. mediation and emphasized Washington's significant role in establishing peace, the ministry said in a readout. She also lauded the signing of the three memoranda of understanding between Armenia and the United States, which creates new opportunities of cooperation.

The minister also spoke about the effective bilateral cooperation, highlighting the fight against organized crime, cybercrimes and illegal immigration. Sargsyan



attached importance to U.S. support for police reforms and underscored the ongoing discussions around launching a cyberlaboratory.

The U.S. State Department official lauded the close partnership between Armenia and the United States and attached importance to continual cooperation with

the interior ministry.

Issues pertaining to TRIPP (Trump Route for International Peace and Prosperity), which has been presented based on the principles of preserving Armenia's sovereignty and territorial integrity, were also discussed.

Other issues related to cooperation were addressed.

The Trump Route for International Peace and Prosperity is a connectivity project in Armenia envisaged under the U.S.-brokered Armenian-Azerbaijani joint declaration signed in Washington, D.C.

The project is expected to unlock strategic economic opportunities that will create long term benefits by promoting infrastructure investment and enhancing regional connectivity.

Russia says it will comment on US-brokered 'Trump Route' after seeing project details

Russia will be ready to discuss the US-brokered transport corridor between Armenia and Azerbaijan once it has reviewed the project in detail, Russian Foreign Ministry spokesperson Maria Zakharova said at a press briefing, TASS reports.

"We will be able to form a final understanding of how this transport route will function in practice once we have familiarized ourselves with its specific details. This has not happened yet," Zakharova stated.

She stressed that the involvement of non-regional players in South Caucasus affairs, including efforts to unblock

transportation routes, should primarily serve the interests of the countries of the region and their immediate neighbors.

Zakharova also noted several factors that must be taken into account, including Armenia's membership in the Eurasian Economic Union's (EAEU) customs space, the fact that South Caucasus Railway is a subsidiary of Russian Railways, and that Russian border guards, under an international treaty, protect the borders in the area where the route is expected to pass.

She recalled that many important agreements were reached within the framework of the trilateral working group

on unblocking regional transport communications and emphasized that these agreements remain relevant. "Therefore, we look forward to continuing productive dialogue with the Armenian side on this topic," Zakharova concluded.



Armenia proposes reducing mandatory military service term to 18 months



The Ministry of Defense of Armenia has submitted for public discussion a draft amendment to the Law on “Military Service and the Status of Servicemen,” proposing to shorten the duration of mandatory military service.

According to the draft, published on the government’s e-draft.am platform, the length of compulsory service will be

reduced by six months starting with the 2026 summer conscription. This means that the service term for conscripts will be set at 18 months instead of the current 24 months.

In its justification, the Ministry noted that significant steps have been taken in recent years to expand the system of contractual (professional) military service.

Among these measures are the introduction of the “Defender of the Homeland” program, the establishment of a professional sergeant corps, the implementation of a certification system for servicemen, and the organization of long-term service in border units with the retention of military pensions.

The Ministry underlined that these initiatives have already shown positive results and are making contractual service more attractive. Against this backdrop, it considers the reduction of compulsory service duration both reasonable and feasible.

If approved, the reform will take effect from the 2026 summer draft, marking a significant change in Armenia’s military service system.

Armenian FM hints at possible developments in border delimitation with Azerbaijan

Mirzoyan has addressed ongoing negotiations with Azerbaijan, highlighting prospects for progress in border delimitation and regional connectivity projects.

Speaking during a Q&A session in Parliament on September 10, Mirzoyan described the Washington Declaration and the initialing of a peace treaty as “landmark events.” He stressed that achieving lasting peace is a long-term process requiring care, caution, and consistency.

“Today, we are working with Azerbaijan in the direction of unblocking. There may be new developments in the border delimitation process,” Mirzoyan said,

adding that discussions are also continuing with US partners, particularly on railway and other joint infrastructure projects.

The foreign minister underlined that humanitarian issues remain a top priority for Armenia, including the release of prisoners of war and detained persons, as well as clarifying the fate of the missing.

While acknowledging that challenges will persist even after the signing of a peace treaty, Mirzoyan emphasized that the risks of escalation and renewed armed conflict have been reduced to a minimum at this stage.

Russia expects steps by Armenia and Azerbaijan to organize 3+3 meeting

Moscow expects Armenia and Azerbaijan to take “practical steps” to swiftly agree on the venue and timeframe of the next 3+3 format meeting, Russian Foreign Ministry spokesperson Maria Zakharova has said.

Speaking at a press briefing, Zakharova described the 3+3 format as a “productive platform” in terms of

Armenian-Azerbaijani normalization and discussions on important matters pertaining to the region.

“Moscow is ready to support the partners in all directions,” she said, adding that Russia prioritizes “sustainable reconciliation” between Armenia and Azerbaijan and strengthening of peace in South Caucasus.

The idea of the 3+3 platform for regional cooperation was brought forward by Türkiye and Azerbaijan after the 2020 Nagorno Karabakh war and was supposed to include Armenia, Russia, Azerbaijan, Georgia, Turkey and Iran, however Georgia has repeatedly refused to participate. The platform has held a few meetings since its inception.

US announces \$145 million in aid to Armenia



The US will provide \$145 million in assistance to Armenia as part of efforts

to expand regional connectivity and economic development, an official announced September 11.

Brendan Hanrahan, the senior bureau official for the State Department's Bureau of European and Eurasian Affairs, said in a post on the US social media company X's platform that he was excited to "advance the commitments made by our countries at (US President Donald) Trump's historic

peace summit."

"Here in Yerevan, I am thrilled to announce that, working with Congress, we plan to provide \$145 million in assistance for Armenia, which marks the first major step toward making TRIPP a reality. Enjoyed productive discussions on our shared goals for expanding regional connectivity and economic investment," he said.

Tehran hosts third Armenia-Iran-India meeting

The third trilateral meeting of the Republic of Armenia, the Islamic Republic of Iran and the Republic of India at the level of regional directors general of the foreign ministries of the three countries was held on September 8, 2025 hosted by Tehran. The Iranian delegation was headed by H. E. Mr. Mohammad Reza Bahrami, Director General for South Asia at the Ministry of Foreign Affairs of the Islamic Republic of Iran; the Indian delegation was led by H. E. Mr. Anand Prakash, Joint Secretary (PAI), of the Ministry of External Affairs of the Republic of India; and the Armenian delegation was chaired by H. E. Ms. Anahit Karapetyan, Head of the Asia-Pacific Department of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs of the Republic of Armenia.

The three parties expressed satisfaction with the regular and annual holding of the trilateral meeting, reviewed the progress achieved as a result of decisions made at the first meeting hosted in Yerevan in April 2023 and the second meeting hosted in New Delhi in December 2024.



They further emphasized fulfillment of the goals set for the said meetings in order to secure mutual interests and promote prosperity and welfare in the region.

The three sides at this meeting emphasized expanding and deepening cooperation, especially in the fields of connectivity, the International North-South Transport Corridor (INSTC), and the Armenian "Crossroads of Peace" project, utilizing

the strategic position of the Chabahar port in this regard. The parties also reviewed and stressed initiatives aimed at further developing relations in economic, trade, culture, people to people relations and other areas of mutual interest.

By mutual agreement, it was decided that the next trilateral meeting will be held next year in Armenia on a mutually convenient date to the three parties.

High economic activity maintained throughout 2024, says cenbank governor

Central Bank Governor Martin Galstyan on September 9 credited the high growth in services, construction, and trade for the strong economic activity throughout 2024. He made the remarks in parliament during a presentation of the Central Bank's annual report.

"Nonetheless, a certain slowdown was recorded in the second half of the year, and economic growth approached the stable, long-term assessed level, amounting to

5.9% for 2024," he said.


He noted that a gradual slowdown was recorded in the pace of foreign demand growth, mostly due to a drop in tourism. "Instead, domestic demand was significantly boosted, mainly due to high growth in private consumption, driven by a continuous increase in income and the spending of savings."

Martin Galstyan stated that by the end of 2024, the 12-month inflation rate was

1.5%, while the 12-month core inflation rate was 0.9%.

Armenian High-Tech Industry minister meets U.S. State Department delegation



Armenian Minister of High-Tech Industry Mkhitar Hayrapetyan received the delegation led by Brendan Hanrahan, the U.S. State Department's Senior Bureau Official for the Bureau of European and Eurasian Affairs.

"Welcoming the members of the delegation, Minister Hayrapetyan emphasized the importance of the visit, noting that the continuous development and strengthening of Armenia-U.S. bilateral relations is a strategic priority for the Government of Armenia. He stressed that this visit is

considered an important step toward establishing a new quality of relations," the ministry said in a readout.

"During the meeting, Minister Hayrapetyan expressed confidence that the delegation's visit would significantly contribute to the effective implementation of the measures envisaged by the Memorandum of Understanding on Innovative Partnership in the Fields of Artificial Intelligence and Semiconductors, signed between the Governments of Armenia and the United States on August 8. According to the Minister, this cooperation creates broad opportunities for the development of Armenia's economy. In his remarks, Brendan Hanrahan emphasized that the content of the Armenia-U.S. Memorandum of Understanding demonstrates the significant potential for bilateral cooperation in the technology sector. A wide range of

issues were discussed during the meeting, including the possibilities for developing coordinated policies in the field of artificial intelligence, implementing investments in Armenia's semiconductor ecosystem, and developing capabilities for chip design, verification, and testing. The sides also touched upon the expansion of U.S. multinational companies' representation in Armenia, investment promotion, streamlining of export procedures, implementation of R&D projects, as well as the issuance of an export license for Firebird's infrastructure intended for an AI data center and opportunities for improving existing solutions. Particular emphasis was placed on expanding cooperation in the fields of cybersecurity and space, as well as exploring other potential directions for the further development of Armenia-U.S. relations in the technology sector."

Armenia, US explore new avenues for trade and investment

Armenia's Minister of Economy received Brendan Hanrahan, Director of the US State Department's Bureau of European and Eurasian Affairs, for a meeting focused on strengthening economic ties between Armenia and the United States. Deputy Minister Anushik Avetian and US Ambassador to Armenia Kristina Kvien were also in attendance.

The discussions covered prospects for expanding economic cooperation and increasing bilateral trade. The two sides reviewed opportunities to deepen collaboration across several key sectors, including trade and investment, agriculture and

food safety, energy, high technologies and innovation, IT and the digital economy, as well as tourism.

Both parties emphasized the importance of advancing mutually beneficial cooperation and reaffirmed their readiness to continue joint efforts to strengthen economic ties, improve the investment climate, and promote new initiatives.

Minister of Economy highlighted Armenia's strong interest in the TRIPP communication program and proposed developing projects within a public-private partnership (PPP) framework to attract private investment. He also suggested

drafting a detailed roadmap for the program's implementation.

The meeting also included an exchange of views on the "Crossroads of Peace" initiative. The Minister stressed that the project is not only aimed at boosting economic connectivity but also at promoting peace and stability in the region, contributing to enhanced regional cooperation and reducing tensions.

Finally, the Minister underlined Armenia's appreciation for US expertise and support in modernizing infrastructure and strengthening border security.

Armenia participates in Africa Climate Summit

On September 8-10, the Delegation of the Republic of Armenia, participated in the Second Africa Climate Summit (ACS2) held in Addis Ababa.

In his remarks, Ambassador Mher Margaryan, the Head of the Negotiating Team of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs of Armenia for the 17th Conference of the Parties (COP17) to the UN Convention

on Biological Diversity, emphasized Armenia's readiness to expand cooperation with African partners, stressing shared challenges and mutual interests in the field of biodiversity.

Mher Margaryan also reiterated Armenia's readiness to raise the concerns of vulnerable regions, foster inclusive partnerships, and mobilize international

financial resources within the framework of its COP17 Presidency, scheduled for 2026.

During the visit, Ambassador Margaryan held bilateral meetings with African partners to discuss prospects for enhanced cooperation, including in the context of the COP-17 conference.

Pashinyan credits legitimacy for ‘unlimited’ available foreign defense markets

Prime Minister Nikol Pashinyan on September 15 credited legitimacy for what he described as the “unlimited” foreign armament markets available to Armenia’s military for defensive purposes.

He addressed military matters during the Comprehensive Security and Resilience 2025 International Conference in Yerevan.

“We’ve always said that we need a strong army,” Pashinyan noted. “But this is also one of those topics where we must ask ourselves: what does a strong army actually mean? Stronger than whom? One, two, three, or four potential adversaries?”

If it turns out that one nominal adversary is supported by two or three other powerful actors, that this entire strategy

could be rendered meaningless,” he said, adding that the term “strong” must be clarified — does it mean strong alone or strong together with allies?

“If it means together with allies, dozens of questions arise. If it means without allies, questions arise here too. Therefore, there is an urgent need to clarify our terminology,” Pashinyan said. He emphasized that articulating the military’s core objective stems from this line of questioning.

“The Armed Forces of the Republic of Armenia have no tasks beyond the country’s internationally recognized borders. Their objective is to protect the internationally recognized territory of

the Republic of Armenia. This is strategy of legitimacy in the context of the military,” Pashinyan said, highlighting the tangible outcomes of this approach. “In the past, Armenia’s access to weapons and armaments markets was highly limited — not only geographically, but also in terms of availability. Today, our markets are essentially unlimited. Why? Because no country discussing military-technical cooperation with us has to worry that the weapons could be used for illegitimate international purposes.

No one can dispute Armenia’s right to defend its sovereign, internationally recognized territory. This is undisputable,” he concluded.

Environment Minister reaffirms Armenia’s commitment to biodiversity protection

Armenian Minister of Environment Hambarzum Matevosyan on September 12 reaffirmed the country’s commitment to preserving biodiversity.

He made the remarks at the Road to COP17 initiative’s launch event organized by the Ministry of Environment and the American University of Armenia Acopian Center for the Environment in collaboration with the Secretariat of the Convention on Biological Diversity (CBD).

He said that Armenia has been consistently implementing the goals of the CBD ever since joining it in 1993.

13% of Armenian territory presently encompasses protected areas, and authorities aim to increase the number in the next five years in line with international standards.

“Armenia’s vision until 2030 is to view



the preservation of biodiversity as a pillar of national security, economic development and social stability. We want to establish an approach where nature becomes an equal partner and not a victim on the road of economic development,” Matevosyan said, highlighting international cooperation and involvement of youth.

United Nations Resident Coordinator in Armenia Françoise Jacob said that the

biodiversity topic is a great opportunity to raise awareness about Armenia’s natural heritage. “Unfortunately, few people both in and out of the country know that Armenia is considered to be one of the thirty biodiversity hotspots in the world,” she said.

She said that hosting COP17 must be not only a measure of increasing international reputation but also form a broad perception and support within the country for the goals.

“The government, universities, civil society and private sector must unite efforts to ensure a green and sustainable future,” she said.

The 17th meeting of the Conference of the Parties to the Convention on Biological Diversity (COP17) will take place in Armenia in 2026.

Armenian customs service to operate along TRIPP, says official

The Armenian customs service will operate on TRIPP – the Trump Route for International Peace and Prosperity, an Armenian official said Friday.

“I reaffirm that the customs service will operate there,” State Revenue Committee Chairman Eduard Hakobyan said in

parliament in response to a question from opposition MP Artsvik Minasyan from the Hayastan faction.

“Regarding details, they are subject to discussion. Nonetheless, regardless of that, our general customs policy is total, meaning, we are carrying out reforms

towards facilitating trade on all our borders,” Hakobyan said.

The Trump Route for International Peace and Prosperity is a connectivity project in Armenia envisaged under the U.S.-brokered Armenian-Azerbaijani joint declaration signed in Washington, D.C.

Armenian President comments on transforming ties with Russia into collegial relations



In recent years, Armenia has reached the point where its relations with Russia have truly become collegial, President Vahagn Khachaturyan has said.

“Now the relations with Russia are completely different; they are truly partnership relations. The relationship between Russia and Armenia is not that of a younger brother and older brother, but simply collegial relations. This is what we

have actually achieved over the past four years,” he said in an interview with the Russian RTVI.

Armenia wants its Russian partners to take into account the independent decisions of the Armenian authorities, he said.

“The Armenian government works for the well-being and prosperity of the residents of Armenia and the Republic of Armenia. Therefore, the Armenian government and authorities must independently decide with whom and how to conduct trade and maintain diplomatic relations,” the President of Armenia stated.

He also commented on Russian Deputy PM Alexey Overchuk’s statement that Armenia “must make a choice between the Eurasian Economic Union (EAEU) and the EU since it is not possible to sit on two chairs at the same time.” Overchuk

made the comments after the Armenian parliament passed the [EU bill](#).

Khachaturyan said Overchuk himself must be asked what he meant by saying “sit on two chairs.”

“In any case, now no one is telling us anything, and we are not violating anything. We are working under the conditions that exist within the EAEU framework. The conditions that exist economically in the European Union, we are working with those, and so far there have been no problems. In general, what is the need to talk about this now? What is the need to put that question so sharply? Why is Overchuk presenting this issue differently to the Russian public? There are trade agreements and certain arrangements. Are they working? Yes, they are working,” he said.

Armenian prosecutor-general, Swiss counterpart discuss partnership



Prosecutor-General of Armenia, Anna Vardapetyan, held a meeting on September 9 with Attorney General of the Swiss Confederation Stefan Blättler, on the sidelines

of the 30th Annual Conference and General Meeting of the International Association of Prosecutors (IAP) in Singapore.

Vardapetyan thanked her Swiss counterpart for accepting the invitation to hold a meeting and discuss prospects for developing cooperation in the criminal justice sector, Vardapetyan’s office said in a press release.

Vardapetyan lauded the existing cooperation between the prosecutions of Armenia and Switzerland and expressed gratitude for the support by Swiss partners within the framework of money

laundering investigations in Armenia.

The discussion also touched upon the opportunities of developing international-legal cooperation and prospects of deepening partnership between the two countries as part of Eurojust.

Vardapetyan was nominated as member of the IAP Executive Committee during the body’s April 8 meeting in Buenos Aires. The election of a member to the Executive Committee is expected during the current session.

Catholics of All Armenians to meet Pope Leo XIV at the Vatican

His Holiness Karekin II, Supreme Patriarch and Catholicos of All Armenians, departed for the Vatican on September 15 for a meeting with His Holiness Pope Leo XIV.

The Catholicos is accompanied by Bishop Daniel Findikyan, Head of the Graduate Division of the Gevorkian Theological Seminary; Rev. Fr. Garegin Hambardzumyan, Director of the Mother See’s Inter-Church Relations Department; Rev. Fr. Yesayi



Grigoryan, the Catholicos’ staff-bearer; and

Rev. Fr. Vahram Melikyan, Director of the Catholicosate’s Information Department.

In the Vatican, His Holiness Karekin II will be joined by Archbishop Khajag Barsamian, Pontifical Legate of Western Europe and Representative of the Catholicos of All Armenians to the Holy See, as well as Bishop Hovakim Manukyan, Primate of the Diocese of the Armenian Church in the United Kingdom and Ireland.


Ucom supports ArmDrone Community in teaching technologies of the future

Now, for the first time, GUSD is exploring a program dedicated to Western Armenian, reports the Armenian National Committee of America Glendale (ANCA Glendale).

ANCA Glendale is calling it a turning point for language development and community identity.

The City of Glendale has opened a survey to collect community feedback on this proposal.

ANCA Glendale is urging residents to respond and show strong support, stressing that the adoption of the program can depend on community members making their voices heard.

"We fought hard for Armenian language programs to have a place in Glendale



schools, and for years Eastern Armenian has thrived," said Lucy Petrossian, Chairperson of ANCA Glendale. "But Western Armenian is endangered worldwide. Every time a child in Glendale learns to read and speak it, we are helping secure the future of our culture. This is not just a program,

Buenos Aires. Armenia has been a member of the IAP since 1999 but this marks the first time that an Armenian Prosecutor-General was nominated to the Executive Committee.

Armenia ratifies ILO Violence and Harassment Convention

The Armenian parliament has ratified the International Labour Organization's (ILO) Violence and Harassment Convention.

The bill passed with 94 votes in favor.

The Armenian legislation already prohibits forced labor, discrimination, violence or harassment, but the ratification of the convention implies additional reforms, the Ministry of Labor and Social



Affairs said.

The Violence and Harassment

Convention, formally the Convention concerning the elimination of violence and harassment in the world of work is a convention to "recognize the right of everyone to a world of work free from violence and harassment, including gender-based violence and harassment". It is the 190th ILO convention (code C190) and was adopted during the 108th session of the International Labour Organization.

Armenia's "Armath" robotics team wins gold at World Robot Olympiad



Armenia's "Armath" robotics team has returned home triumphant after winning first place in the junior age category of the World Robot Olympiad Open Championship, one of the most prestigious global competitions in robotics.

Representing the Armath engineering laboratories of Aygut village school (Gegharkunik region) and Yerevan School

No.131, the young engineers scored 162 points, outpacing Romania's "3 Ways of Garbage" and Germany's "JT-Innovators," who finished second and third respectively.

The winning team consisted of Ararat Bayanduryan and Grigor Khojayan from Aygut village school, and Vahe Gabrielyan from Yerevan School No.131. The team was

coached and led by Shahen Arabachyan.

Their innovative project – a robotic device designed to detect leaks in gas pipelines – impressed the judges and secured their victory.

This year's Olympiad brought together 214 teams from 44 countries, following a two-stage process. Teams first compete nationally, with Armenia's contest organized by **Contest Lab**, and the highest-scoring teams advance to the international round.

The champions were greeted at Yerevan's airport by the leadership of the Union of Advanced Technology Enterprises (UATE), headed by CEO Sargis Karapetyan

Launched in 2011, Armath is Armenia's flagship national program for non-formal engineering education and one of UATE's cornerstone initiatives. Implemented with the support of the Ministry of Education, Science, Culture and Sports, the program now operates around 630 engineering laboratories across the country – accessible in nearly every second school. Today, "Armath" stands as Armenia's largest public-private partnership.


